RANDOLPH ABBOTT SHOTWELL, LATE CAPTAIN, 1ST REGIMENT, VIRGINIA VOLUNTEERS, CONFEDERATE STATES ARMY, BORN DEC. 13TH, 1843, IN WELLS RIVER, VA.; DIED JULY 31, 1885, IN RALEIGH, N. C.

The second side bears the following inscription: "A PATRIOT WHOSE HONOR AND CONSCIENCE NO SUFFERING COULD WEAKEN, NO ADVANTAGE TEMPT, NO LOSS DISMAY, AND WHOSE ALL THE GREAT GODS OF HEAVEN WOULD NOT SO NICELY ADMIRE, AND SO EXACTLY PLEASANT TO LIFE ETERNAL THAT MEN SAW THAT HE HAD REACHED THE FULL STATE OF A MAN."
