F. A. Climard, on motion of E. B. Cline, was then elected temporary chairman, and on motion of Wm. Dixon, H. A. Murrill was elected temporary secretary.

After the election of temporary officers E. B. Cline presented for consideration a constitution, after the reading of which by the secretary, the election of permanent officers was moved, and resulted as follows:

The constitution was then amended so as to admit men between 21 and 40. It was decided to meet every Friday evening in the Town Hall. Mr. Ed. B.
