Save the Seeds.

"It is a poor crop that does not
furnish next year's seed." It is a
poor garden that does not leave
enough behind it to renew itself
another year. Therefore, select a
few strong flowers for seed, and
when the petals begin to wilt tie a
little bag of fine muslin or mull over
the withering bloom, as fine seeds
are easily scattered or blown away.
If they are of those that will self
seed, it is not always that one wishes
the plants in the self same spot.

Large beautiful poppies are a
treasure and another year will be in
greater demand than this. There-
fore, save the seeds. While shrubs
should not be allowed to fruit or go
to seed, our short lived plants have
no such excuse for not giving us
seed to renew their presence an-
nually. Home-grown seeds insure
us against purchasing last year's
left-over at prices only due new
seeds.

The little covers alluded to are so
thin as not to interfere with the sun's
ripening the seeds; and when these
are heard to rattle in the pods with-
in, the stalk can be cut just below
the tied muslin and the seeds taken
out and put together and marked at
one's leisure. Each color and kind,
each species, should be kept by
itself, plainly labelled. Seeds should
be kept where they will be continual-
ly dry until time for them to be
sowed. If placed where they may
gather dampness and mildew all pre-
vious care and thought go for
nought.
