**Dr. Cole Dead.**  
 It is with regret we announce the death of Dr. Byron Gray Cole, which occurred Friday, Oct. 11, at 7 o'clock p. m. Dr. Cole was taken sick Friday night, Sept. 20, with a severe chill. Saturday he was in bed most of the day. Sunday he was better and went to church. That night he had another chill and was unable to leave his bed. The doctor was called to see him and feared he had typhoid fever. He continued to grow worse and on Wednesday, Oct. 2, he had three hemorrhages. He, however, rallied from that attack and his family entertained hopes. On Saturday he had severe heart trouble, which prostrated him very much. Next Tuesday he had more hemorrhages and continued to grow worse till Friday night when he passed away. Dr. Cole was last year professor at Claremont college and all remember his nice class of six girls who graduated in the spring.  
 August 6th he and Miss Corrie Bisaner, one of his graduates, were married and went at once to Mt. Airy at which place he was principal of the high school at the time of his death. Mrs. Bisaner was with her daughter the last week of Dr. Cole's illness, and says they will ever remember the kind people of Mt. Airy, all doing what they could to assist them in their trouble. The remains were brought here Sunday morning and in the presence of a large circle of friends, whose eyes were filled with tears of sympathy for the entire family and especially for the young wife. The funeral was conducted at the Methodist church by Revs. Townsend and Murphy and the body was laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery. The deepest sympathy of the entire town goes out to the wife in her great trouble. Dr. Cole was 30 years old last June and 'tis sad to think of so bright a life closed, but God knows best, and the family are greatly comforted by the knowledge that he was prepared to go.

The death of little Sadie Hall was the end of much suffering. For many long months there was a struggle for life, but the little one was patient and manifest wonderful resignation. Some months ago, she desired to more fully consecrate herself to her blessed Savior by receiving the rite of confirmation and accordingly Bishop Cheshire came and received her into full communion with the church. What a sweet, blessed communion it was—daily communion with her precious Savior. On the evening of October 11, just as the clock struck nine, while the shadows of earth crept slowly over the physical world, her sweet spirit emerged from the dark night of suffering into the realms of endless day. "Give me something to put me to sleep," were her last words, and soon she fell "asleep in Jesus."  
 She was carried by her parents and friends to the Happy valley and then gently and tenderly laid to rest until the resurrection morning.  
 Her life has taught me the lesson of patience. It has "made me more manly and mild, And I know how Jesus could liken The kingdom of God to a child."
