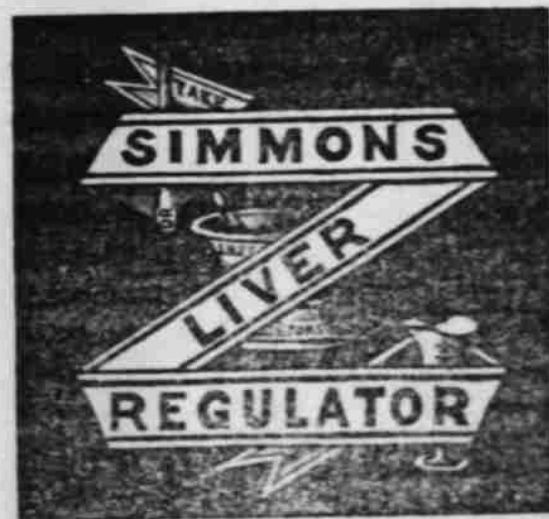
Mrs. J. C. Pritchard and children have gone to Washington to be with the Senator, who has rented a nice residence and they will reside there during the session of Congress.
