LOCAL NEWS.

John Hood, who has been on vacation, returned to duty at the State penitentiary yesterday.

Mr. Moulton Clark as superintendent is doing some very efficient and much needed street work.

The old water tank on top of Marion Mills has been torn down and a new one is being put up.

Mr. A. M. Conley of Linville has been visiting relatives in Marion for the past week and left home Tuesday.

Mr. J. L. Smith had a bad attack of typhoid fever on July 14, but has recovered and is now back to his work.

Afterwards he engaged in the hardware trade, sometimes with partners and for a time on his own account, doing always a successful and profitable business till in the progress of a few years since he retired.

Since then he has carried on the sale of agricultural machinery as agent for leading houses.

Mr. Gilman was 38 years of age on the day of his death. He married Miss Mary Anderson, daughter of Rev. C. M. Anderson, who, with two young children, survived him.

The interment was at 6 o'clock yesterday evening at the town cemetery.

He was prominent as a Mason and a citizen, and was a man of engaging manners and generous disposition, was universally popular and ranked at one time as one of the most successful of the town's merchants. Misfortunes came to him later, though it did not alienate his friends, who will recall his memory regretfully and with sympathy for the ones left behind.

Chapel of the Cross.

The local chapter of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew opened on Sunday last, near Mr. R. J. Hennies' new mission chapel with the above name. Quite a number of persons from the town attended the opening services, while the people of the neighborhood were out in force. The site of the building is at the old Confederate Camp near the Western North Carolina railroad, three miles east of the station, and commands one of the finest mountain views in the county. Rev. Mr. Satterlee preached a strong sermon on practical Christianity. Much of the credit of the construction of this chapel is due Mr. Hennies, who donated the site and was otherwise of assistance to the Brotherhood.

At a meeting of the trustees of Amherst Academy on July 6, W. Bart Berry, Rev. J. S. Godwin and Walstab Smith were elected trustees to fill vacancies. W. M. Moore, a graduate of Wake Forest College, was unanimously chosen as principal of Amherst Academy to succeed Prof. R. L. Simon. The fall term at Amherst will open August 15, 1898.

Mr. John A. Howell, of Grand View, Tenn., is at the Rose Villa. Mr. Howell has purchased from Capt. L. A. Bristol 20 acres of land of the Barkley place, 12 miles east of town, and will at once build a dwelling house, preparatory to the removal of his family here. Mr. Howell impresses us as a pleasant gentleman and a valuable acquisition to our community. He has one of the finest estates in the town, and good prospects in his trade, as we learn.

Mr. John A. Dickson made \$1,000 worth of wheat on four acres, and near Breck Neck, or 21 bushels to the acre. This land was given fifty years ago and has been brought up by Mr. Dickson to its present high state of culture by the application of sound business methods of farming.
