THE WEED IN N. C.

Tobacco Statistics of the Old North State.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The Census Office to-day gave out the tobacco statistics of North Carolina, compiled by Professor Thomas N. Conrad, under the direction of Mr. John Hyde, special agent in charge of the Division of Agriculture.

The total number of planters in the State during the census year was 27,550; the total area devoted to tobacco, 97,077 acres; the total product, 36,375,258 pounds, and the value of the crop to the producer, estimated on the basis of actual sales, \$5,175,833.
