More Waldenses for Burke. The Morganton correspondent of the Charlotte Observer writes the following letter concerning the new Waldensian colonists...

On the 2nd instant a party of 178 Waldenses gathered at the beautiful little city of Torre Pellice, far up among the great Italian Alps.

On November 5th the colonists sailed from Genoa on the splendid steamer Kaiser Wilhelm, of the North German Lloyd Line, and sailing through the Mediterranean and the straits of Gibraltar and across the Atlantic, landed safely in New York last Monday, the 20th.

On last Saturday afternoon an illness of ten days which presupposed fever and pneumonia, Mrs. H. R. Hicks died at her home in Basin City.

At a meeting of the Building Committee of the new Grace Church, held Nov. 29, for the purpose of accepting the work of W. Milne, stone contractor, it was unanimously agreed that the said work has been honestly and most satisfactorily executed.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Old Dominion Steamship Company to West Point, Va. At this point they were taken on board a special train of four cars and carried to their destination without change, arriving Thursday afternoon, Nov. 23rd.

The meeting between the new colonists and those who came before was very affecting. Many of them had relatives—brothers, sisters, fathers and mothers—among the new arrivals and all had many acquaintances and friends.

The new arrivals are a fine lot of people, strong, energetic and full of enthusiasm. Our people have been particularly struck with the beautiful faces of the children, all of whom are taught to read and write when very young.
