The Legislature adjourned with out passing a great many laws it was hoped would be passed, it aitered several beneficial laws so that they will be impeded in their operation, and it placed on the statute books a large number of private measures that might well have come under the general laws. In these particulars it was a disappointment.

But it passed the suffrage amendment to the Constitution. passed a new election law, passed a law providing separate cars; for the races, and repealed the merchant' purchase tax and many obnoxious measures that the two previous Legislatures had put on the statute books.

A wise provision was adopted to meet again in June, 1900, so that any provisions of the laws that worked hardship might be repealed, and any needful amendments might be adopted.
