Many Others Leave For Induction Or For Examination.

Fifteen Negro men from Roxboro and Person County, with Edward Barnette as leader, left here yesterday morning for Fort Bragg for induction to military service, according to the Person Selective Service Board, the members of which at the same time reported that the names of four negro men are listed with incomplete or incorrect addresses.

Names of the four men on whom information is wanted immediately are: Alfred Junius Faulkner, Roxboro, Route 1, care of Clarence Harris; Namon Poole, Route 1, Roxboro, care of Thomas Rogers; John Crowell Crowder, care of McKinley Crowder, 729 Second Street, Washington, D. C., and Stones Wilkerson, Route 3, Hurdle Mills, care of Wade Wilkerson. The four men are asked to report to the Roxboro Board immediately, if possible, and failing that, persons knowing their addresses are requested to report the same to the Board, says Misses Jeanette Wrenn, chief clerk.
