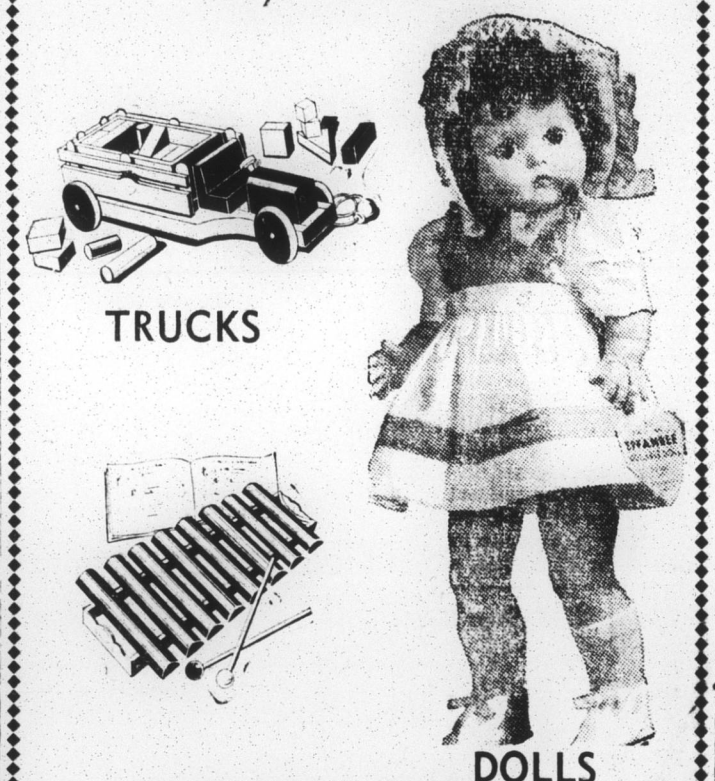
During dinner piano selections were rendered by Misses Barbara Jane Woody, Anne Briggs Moore.
