FOR MEN NOW IN THE ARMY TO RETAIN THEIR PRESENT GRADES BY REENLISTING...

Men now in the Army who reenlist before February 1 will be reenlisted in their present grade. Men honorably discharged can reenlist within 20 days after discharge in the grade they held at the time of discharge, provided they reenlist before February 1, 1946.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE NEW ENLISTMENT PROGRAM

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (1-year enlistments permitted for men now in Army with 6 months' service.)
2. Enlistment age from 17 to 34 years inclusive, except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age.
3. Men reenlisting retain present grades, if they reenlist within 20 days after discharge and before February 1, 1946.
4. The best pay scale, medical care, food, quarters and clothing in Army history.
5. An increase in the reenlistment bonus to \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service.
6. Up to 90 days' paid furlough, depending on length of service, with furlough travel paid to home and return, for men now in Army who enlist.
7. A 30-day furlough every year at full pay.
8. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to reenlist.
9. Option to retire at half pay for life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
10. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights.
11. Family allowances for the term of enlistment for dependents of men who enlist before July 1, 1946.
12. Opportunity to learn one or more of 200 skills and trades.
13. Choice of branch of service and overseas theater in the Air, Ground or Service Forces on 3-year enlistments.

There's a long list of attractive reenlistment privileges in the new Armed Forces Voluntary Recruitment Act of 1945. The ability to keep your present grade is only one of them, but this privilege expires on January 31.

Chinese Policy Of U. S. Comes In For Criticism

London—The London Sunday Observer reported that there are increasing signs that the United States, rather than gradually pulling out of China as originally intended, is daily becoming more deeply involved.

"At present there is every indication the U. S. is in China to stay," said the Observer in a dispatch from Shanghai.

The Observer outlined four main points reflecting greater U. S. involvement in China as follows: 1. Huge United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration expenditures—of which 70 per cent represents American capital—consisting of long term projects as well as immediate.

Proposed indefinite extension of the U. S. Army in the China theater command.

A U. S. proposal to provide transportation for Chinese troops to Manchuria, plus steps for the implementation and repatriation of the Japanese.

General Marshall's obvious intent to speed up the solution of China's political strife.

The Observer said that Marshall Chiang Kai-Shek was faced with the choice of either advocating five power trusteeship for Manchuria or of promoting a compromise agreement with Chinese Communists.

American Pope Is Foreseen

Rome—The newspaper L'Espresso, commenting on the new college of Cardinals with its membership of 42 non-Italians, speculated on a "foreign" successor to Pope Pius XII.

"In all probability," said the newspaper, "we will have an American Pope"—an event which has not occurred in the church since the election of Adrian VI of Utrecht, in 1522.

Meanwhile, an anonymous book entitled "Will We Have An American Pope?" has been circulated in Italy, with a picture of Cardinal Spellman of New York as the American soldier on its cover.

Chetniks Said To Be Forming New Opposition

Vienna—The Army newspaper Stars and Stripes said that Gen. Draza Mihailovitch and from 60,000 to 70,000 Chetnik guerrillas loyal to King Peter II were organizing for an attempt to overthrow Marshal Tito's Yugoslav government.

Arthur Noyes, Stars and Stripes correspondent, reported that he recently spent five days with Mihailovitch and his followers hiding out in the mountains south of Belgrade waiting for Spring to launch their revolt.

Noyes said the Chetniks, including many women and young girls, were hard-bitten, well-fed and well-armed but were living under primitive conditions in cleverly hidden mountain huts.

Tito's forces long have sought Mihailovitch on charges of collaborating with the Germans.

Noyes quoted Mihailovitch as denying the charges but added that he was hiding because he did not believe he would get a fair trial.

Noyes said Mihailovitch considers the troops now in the mountains as "the nucleus for a revolutionary army."
