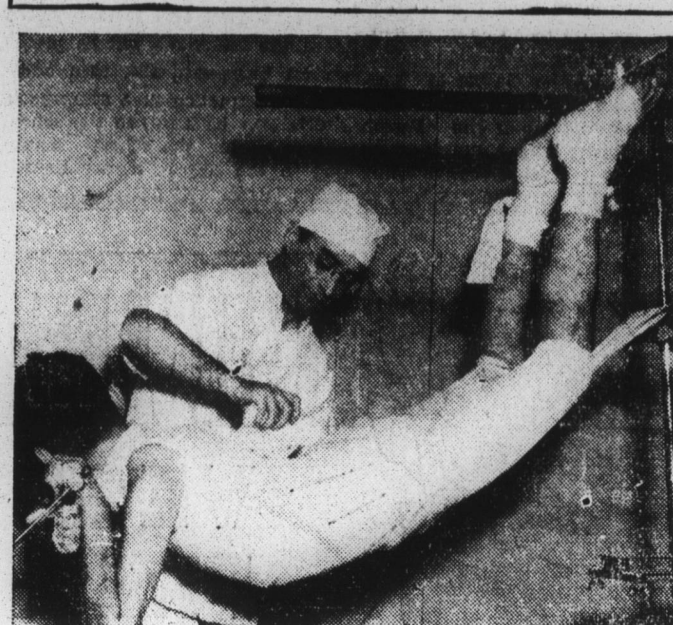

## Clearing Up The Streams

This is the first of a series of articles written by farmers who are doing an excellent job in conservation farming. Mr. L. L. Long, a conservation farmer that the Person County soil conservation work unit has been working with since the fall of 1939, was asked by the writer of this weekly column to write this one for him this week and to say anything that he wished.

So here goes the first article written by conservation farmers. Mr. Long is well known throughout the county; He owns 109 acres about 7 miles North West of Roxboro on Route No. 1. His farm perhaps is more specifically known to members of Civic Clubs and others as the place where you get delicious barbecue chicken in the shade of the trees around his tobacco barns.

**Lewis Long's Own Statement**  
"Since I have been a member of Dan River Soil Conservation I have learned a great deal of how to take care of a farm by building terraces and sowing meadow strips. Build your meadow strips in the lower parts of the land that does not drain properly. Sow it early in the fall with herd grass, orchard grass and red top clover so that it can get a good start to stand the winter. By doing this, the next Spring you can mow that for feed. The first year you can get two crops nice hay and the second year you can get three crops of hay. By keeping it limed and properly fertilized this land will get richer every year.

"Build your terraces on the hillside so that they can drain into the meadow strip. That will take care of all surplus dirt instead of going down the gulleys and branches like the old-fashioned way. We have a farm on which six years ago there was plenty of sand to be hauled to town and other places by the car loads. Today there are grass mixtures growing on these places and you can't tell there are any sandbars at all, this due to terracing and building meadow strips."
