Durham, N. C., Feb. 7.—The winningest "little" team in the South will attempt to shackle the height of the East's number one giant-killing five when Duke's six foot Blue Devils meet Temple's six foot-three Ows in Philadelphia, Saturday.

Coach Gerry Gerard's Blue Devils can floor only one starter as tall as 6' 2 1/2", and two of the first team men are under six feet. Only one team which has faced Duke all season, the Norfolk Naval Training Station, has offered the Blue Devils an equal opportunity in the height department.

Duke has won its games with accurate shooting, expert floor play, and a pair of aces—Ed Koffenberger and Buber Seward—who can jump high enough to hold their own under the boards.
