

### Clearing Up The Streams

Much of the success in getting a good growth of kudzu depends on proper care during the first growing season. Person County farmers last winter and spring applied manure and superphosphate before planting kudzu seedlings. The person unit of the Dan River soil conservation district supplied 18,000 kudzu seedlings to 28 farmers last April. This kudzu was planted on roadbanks and poor land for erosion control. When well established much of this acreage will be used for hay and for grazing livestock.

**Cultivation of Kudzu Necessary**  
Cultivation is so important in the establishment of a stand of kudzu that is stressed at this particular season following recent rains. Kudzu like all other plants responds to good seedbed preparation, proper fertilization. Adequate amounts of fertilizer and manure to stimulate vigorous growth on poor soils will also stimulate the growth of grass and weeds. Unless the same type of clean cultivation that would be given water-

melons and other vine crops is given to kudzu, grass and weeds will compete so severely with the kudzu plants the first year that the benefits of the liberal fertilizer treatment will be nullified.

Proper cultivation includes sufficient plowing along the rows to control other vegetation, to keep the soil well broken, and to keep the vines dragged back to a relatively narrow strip along each row, as well as hoeing weeds and grass out of the rows, if necessary.

Such a system of cultivation will result in a thick stand of plants along the rows by keeping the surface of the soil in good condition for vines to take root at the joints and develop new crowns. Soil thrown on the runners by the plow induces root formation. Where corn or other crops have been planted in the middles between the rows of kudzu, cultivation of the row crops will control weeds and keep the soil in good condition for establishment of kudzu plants.

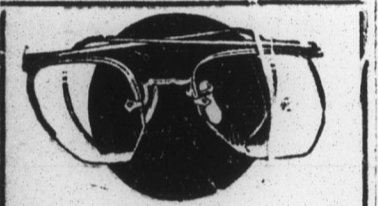
