instruction and 100 hours of field instruction. Under the 4 year general agriculture program the minimum requirement is 1200 hours of instruction. Mr. Liles states that all except two of the 18 are eligible for the four year course.

Assisting Mr. Liles in this program is Lawrence Rogers, Route 3, Roxboro who is a full time assistance teacher of agriculture specializing in veterans work. Their class room job outline calls for study in such subjects as farm management, soil conservation, field crops, farm mechanics, livestock and other farm enterprises.

VETERANS TO STUDY SOIL CONSERVATION

A good portion of the Veterans Farmers Training Program will be devoted to soil conservation. Mr. Liles requires all veterans receiving

this training to have a Soil Conservation District farm plan. Recently he submitted the following names of veterans requesting the Dan River District to prepare soil survey maps on the farms in which they are farming either with their father, by themselves or with a landlord:

All of the above veterans are scattered throughout the southern half of the county.

One of these veterans, Stephen W. Glenn has already had a district

farm plan prepared on his farm. This fall in his 4 acre pasture demonstration Mr. Liles states that the fertilizer to be used will be furnished by the Plant Food Institute.

FIRST STEP IS STUDY OF SOILS AND THEIR CAPABILITIES

J. D. Roberts, Soil Surveyor of the Dan River District last week made a detail soil survey of 15 of the 18 farms in which he classified the land according to its capability class. This survey will constitute the basis of study of the various soil types, amount of sheet and gully erosion that has taken place, the slope and lay of land and its present land use.

Assistance in working out the required District farm plan will begin next week with personnel of the Person Unit in cooperation with Mr. Liles and the Veterans Farmers

training Program in using this soil survey in making a farm plan of correct land use through soil conservation procedures.

While Mr. Liles is in charge of the program in the southern half of the county, a similar program of training is underway in the northern section of Person County with J. M. Wilburn, agriculture teacher of Bethel Hill in charge.

It is understood that A. W. Jones, negro teacher of the Roxboro Grammar Graded school is also engaged in this program with negro veteran farmers.
