It's hard for me to imagine what the world or outdoor recreation would be like without trails to explore. It would certainly be a lot more difficult to spend time traveling through the woods if we had to bushwhack every time. So whether or not I'm able to get out on a trail Saturday or not, I'm sure I'll be thinking about one or another, and appreciating the ways they've enriched my life.

Durham woman faces multiple felony charges

Deputies with the Person County Sheriff's Office arrested Rachel Fae Robinson, 25, of Durham Friday on multiple felony burglary-related charges in connection with a break-in that reportedly occurred last October.

Warrants for Robinson's arrest were issued in January.

Robinson was charged with 12 counts of larceny of a firearm and one count each of breaking and entering, larceny and conspiracy.

Robinson was released from custody after posting a \$7,500 secured bond. She is scheduled to appear in Person County District Court on June 28.

Gas prices continue to fall across state

For the third consecutive week, the average retail price for a gallon of regular unleaded gasoline fell significantly in the past week, according to information released Monday by *NorthCarolinaGasPrices.com*.

The average retail price for a gallon of gas in the past week reportedly fell 5.1 cents per gallon statewide, averaging \$3.67 Monday.

The decrease came on the heels of a drop of 8.6 cents per gallon the previous week and a

decline of 0.7 cents per gallon in the week prior to that.

This past week's decrease compares with the national average that has decreased 3.2 cents per gallon in the past week to \$3.77 per gallon.

Including the change in gas prices in North Carolina in the past week, prices Monday were

\$1.02 per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 15.1 cents per gallon lower than one month ago.

The national average has decreased 13.7 cents per gallon during the last month and stands \$1.04 per gallon higher than this day one year ago.
