Arrest warrants issued for PHS teacher

Megan Trainor charged with taking indecent liberties with minor

A Person County Sheriff's Office investigation of alleged inappropriate behavior by a Person High School (PHS) teacher was

continuing Friday evening. Arrest warrants were issued Thursday for PHS ninth-grade math teacher Megan Trainor, 24, who was suspended from her position by Person County Schools' (PCS) officials Wednesday. Trainor has been employed by PCS for

three years. PCS officials are also continuing an investigation into the alleged inappropriate behavior by Trainor. Trainor of 321 Floyd Hicks Rd. in Timberlake is charged in the arrest warrants with a felony

count of taking indecent liberties with a minor and a misdemeanor charge of preparing obscene photographs/slides/motion pictures. As of late Friday afternoon,

Saluting veterans on 11-11-11

Dedication of Korean War monument highlights annual holiday festivities

The City of Roxboro rolled out its patriotic red, white and blue carpet Friday for the annual Veterans Day service at the Person County Courthouse.

In addition, Boy Scout Adam Moore, who fulfilled an earlier promise, presided over a ceremony dedicating a new Korean War memorial he envisioned and made possible.

As a blustery, November wind raked over the assembly, Person High School's JROTC guard presented the colors and Rev. Donald Daniels of Mt. Zion United Methodist Church delivered the Invocation. Mt. Zion Praise Band member Joey Scott delivered the National Anthem and Kathy Young, director of the Person County Museum of History, presided as master of ceremonies.

While Young was busy holding down her notes in the gusty conditions, Angie Brown, president of the museum's board of directors, was introduced to welcome Per-

Roxboro police honor military at Wednesday service

"America is not free," Henry Pennington said during a Veterans Day service Wednesday. "America is expensive."

Pennington was referring to the sacrifices made and the lives that have been lost in the fight to protect America's freedom, and as a World War II veteran who served in Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army, Pennington knows something about those sacrifices.

Both he and Nelson Berryman, a Vietnam

veteran and Purple Heart recipient, were the featured speakers at Wednesday morning's Veterans Day service hosted by the Roxboro Police Department (RPD) at the Roxboro National Guard Armory.

Pennington, a Wilson native who currently resides in Person County, was also stationed at Dachau Concentration Camp after it had been liberated. He spoke about his time serving in World War II, and about some of the atrocities committed by the Nazis.
