Progressing Nicely.

Mayor Brown informs us that the new railroad leading out to Fayetteville is progressing nicely, four miles being graded, ties bedded and the grading to be finished as far as Upchurch's mill, by the end of this month.

The Improvement Society.

The Executive Committee of the Improvement Society met Wednesday evening at the residence of Mr. Wm. Saunders.

The Committee resolved to provide the streets with one dozen more barrels for waste paper and rubbish. It also authorized the President to petition the Town Commissioners to co-operate with the Society in keeping the streets clear of paper and, if necessary, to pass an ordinance making it a misdemeanor to throw papers in the streets.

The Society earnestly appeals to the people to take some pride in the appearance of the town, and to put paper and rubbish in the barrels provided for that purpose.

The Sea Board Air Line, under its new management, is acquiring additional railroad lines and will ere long be the most direct and quickest route from North to South. It is a great system, and it will be still greater when it is completed to Florida and thus becomes the great line between the West Indies and the Northern part of the United States. We look for great developments in this system within the next few years. The completion of the new railroad between Ridgeway and Richmond will be an important link of the Seaboard Air Line.—Warrenton Record.

The Fayetteville Observer says: So far this season 2500 crates of strawberries have been shipped by the Southern Express from points on the Atlantic and Yadkin between here and Wilmington alone. There is a quantity of other truck shipped of course. J. J. Crosswell the splendid route agent of the Southern Express, with headquarters in this city, estimates that the shipments of strawberries from this line will foot up 10,000 crates for the season. He says that when he came here, eight years ago, there was not a crate of berries shipped over the Wilmington division of the C. F. & Y. V. railway.
