thority in the matter, that the road
intended to accept the proposal. The
only reply ever received was a brief
note saying they considered the Board's
proposition a very liberal one.

In passing the resolution referred to,
the Board, in the estimation of the
minority, did a very unbusiness-like
thing; and the minority acted accord-
ingly, even at the risk of incurring
the displeasure of the majority.

In the face of the facts above enumer-
ated, to say that the R. R. Co. had
accepted the town's proposal is a
statement not in accordance with the
information in possession of the Board.
