If you're a film buff, tonight's your night as local and national filmmakers discuss their art and show some old and new projects.

"Go Fish" director Rose Trouche and writer/actress Guinevere Turner created a stir with their provocative lesbian comedy, and now they're rejoining the Hanes Visiting Artist Lecture Series.

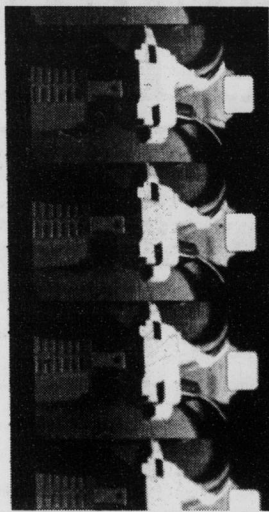

The second installment of local film festival "Flicker" will be presented Thursday at Local 506. The festivities will start a little earlier this time, about 8:30 p.m.

Event organizer and local musician/video director Norwood Cheek said this month's crop includes more 16mm works than super-8. Expect showings from Tom Whiteside of Durham, Katri Snyder and Jamie Patton, as well as from the Wifflefest collective.

Cheek said that some of the plans were still up in the air, but he hopes to recruit filmmakers visiting town (Trouche and Turner of "Go Fish," and John Schultz of

30 Bands Bond For AIDS

More than 30 bands. Seven shows. And a good cause.

The Triangle AIDS Awareness Benefit was originally scheduled as one show, but quickly grew much larger. The series kicked off Wednesday with four bands at Cat's Cradle in Carrboro. But don't worry if you missed that one, there are plenty more.

Rob Genadio, one of the benefit's organizers, said although people are aware of AIDS, awareness alone is not enough.

He said awareness tables at the concert venues will distribute flyers and other information.

"We also wanted to get the message across. It is a big problem ... people still aren't protecting themselves, they're feeling invulnerable," he said.

Genadio encouraged concertgoers to arrive early at the shows: "We're really grateful to the bands who have agreed to open and we don't want people to miss them."

"Sometimes the sacrifice of the bands gets skipped over, they're trying to make a living out of it ... they can't play the same club within a month, so this is a big sacrifice. But they were all up for it, it was pretty incredible."

Genadio said all proceeds will go to the following AIDS service organizations: AIDS Service Agency of Orange, AIDS Service Agency for Wake, and AIDS Service Project of Durham. Genadio said the money would be used for different purposes, but he said, "since this is for AIDS awareness, it will probably be more education outreach."

Cover charges are suggestions and greater donations will be accepted.
