cause she is the smallest on our team. I was quite surprised she was able to get a home run because the fence is so close here, but she's got blinding speed."


The Yellow Jackets got another run in the fifth inning to make the score 3-2, and from there UNC just couldn't get another hit to even things up.

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Boston Globe: Lewis Did Coke With Bias

BOSTON — The Reggie Lewis story took another twist Tuesday, with a report that the former Celtics captain once did cocaine with Len Bias — an All-American who died of an overdose.

A roommate of Lewis was quick to deny the report. The Boston Globe re-ported Tuesday that Derrick Lewis, a friend and college teammate of Bias, used co-caine with Reggie Lewis and Bias in 1985.

Reggie Lewis died three months after collapsing in a game. The cause of death was listed as an irregular heartbeat caused by the common-cold virus. The Wall Street Journal said cocaine wasn't adequately investigated as a cause of Lewis' collapse.
