

Police Continue to Work for Accreditation UNC Grad Student Dies After Motorcycle Crash

University Police are striving to make the campus a safer place by becoming the first university police department in North Carolina to receive national accreditation. The project, started by former University Police Chief Alana Ennis, would provide guidelines to improve the campus force's efficiency by requiring them to adhere to the standards followed by most city

police departments. "For years the goal has been to become a more professional department and becoming accredited will help us do that because it gives a standard operating procedure to go by," said University Patrol Capt. Greg Graves. UNC Police have been preparing for the final evaluation by writing policy manuals which provide evidence that it meets the criteria set by the Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies.

CALEA will conduct the final assessment of the department September 16-20. During the evaluation period CALEA will examine files and will tour police facilities while questioning employees. CALEA officials will also ride with officers during shifts and ask the officers how they would respond to potential situations. "We are absolutely ready for our on-site now, and I am confident that we are going to do well," Graves said. During CALEA's assessment, the organiza-

tion will hold public evaluation nights during which the community will be given the opportunity to assess the University Police and its service to the community. "I'm confident that the majority of the comments will be positive. We rarely have any complaints," said Graves. If the University is accredited, campus police would be eligible for more federal grants and equipment. With increased funds, Graves said the department hoped to add more officers and investigators.

John Michael Martz, a doctoral candidate in psychology, died Monday, July 10 as a result of injuries sustained in a motorcycle accident on U.S. 15-501. Vaida Thompson, director of social psychology for the University, said Martz was completing his dissertation in the Department of Psychology this summer, the culmination of a four-year process toward completing his doctorate, and would have defended it this fall.

Caryl Rusbult, a professor in the Department of Psychology and colleague of Martz's, said he was a talented researcher who would be missed. "He was a talented young scientist who had tremendous promise for advancement in the field. We (the faculty and students in the Psychology department) are trying to finish his dissertation so he will be Dr. John Martz," Rusbult said.

Rusbult said Martz was not only a dedicated scientist but also a committed supporter of his wife, Christine Griswold-Martz, and three sons, Andrew, Matthew and Michael.

"He was committed more than anything to having a full, rich home life," she said. "He and his wife shared equally in the raising of their children." Martz worked part-time during the last two years as a computer programmer for the Collaborative Studies Coordinating Center through the Department of Biostatistics.

Jeff Abolafia, the director of statistics at the center, said Martz was an excellent programmer who was "a huge asset to the organization."

"John was really interested in programming, a very big help to everyone," he said. "But he was more dedicated to his family than anything else."

Martz was a graduate of Pennsylvania State University, earning both a B.S. and B.A. in 1988.

He enrolled in UNC in the fall of 1988 and received his master's degree in December 1990.

"I regret not having the opportunity to see John grow and develop as a young professor," Rusbult said. "I will miss him enormously as a student, a colleague and a friend."

The burial will be held in his home state of Pennsylvania. A memorial service will be held later this summer in Chapel Hill. Griswold-Martz was in Pennsylvania and was unavailable for comment.

Greensboro Psych Major Dies of Congestive Heart Failure

Stephen Solomon Adcock, a senior psychology major, died Sunday July 16 of congestive heart failure.

Adcock passed away at Moses Cone Memorial Hospital in his hometown of Greensboro at 1:08 a.m., 2 and a half hours after he was brought to the emergency room, according to a hospital spokesman.

Adcock complained to family members that he was not feeling well and his family took him to the hospital, Adcock's aunt and guardian, Helen Irvin, said.

Irvin said her nephew was an intelligent and sensitive young man. "He was very interested in music and wrote poetry and (was) a gentleman."

A transfer from George Washington University in Washington, D.C., which he attended from September 1991 through

June 1993, Adcock came to UNC in the fall term of 1993. He was pursuing a degree in psychology and was expected to graduate in December. He was not enrolled in UNC's summer term.

Adcock was a 1991 graduate of Oak Ridge Academy. He graduated as the valedictorian and the highest ranking cadet in the Academy. He also participated on several athletic teams.

According to Colonel Frederick Kennedy, president of the academy,

Adcock was an active member of the campus. "It comes as a shock. We all remember him as a vibrant, active young man."

The funeral was held 11 a.m. Wednesday at Hester Baptist Church in Oxford.

According to Dr. Thomas G. Folk, a cardiology fellow at UNC Memorial Hospital, congestive heart failure means the heart is not pumping as strongly as it should be. In younger adults, the common causes are viral illnesses or congenital heart disease.

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
