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total vote tabulation. During the trial, the board argued that they combined all the ballots because several attempts to reach identical totals by polluting through a hand count failed. Shuart said the board would hand count the ballots in the re-election instead of using Scantron sheets. "A computer programmer could make as many mistakes as we could counting by hand," Shuart said. "A Scantron sheet is a waste of paper." Bruce agreed with Shuart about hand

counting the votes. "There's nothing wrong with doing hand counts," Bruce said. "If you have a systematic method of hand counting, there's no reason why it shouldn't be as accurate as a computer count." However, McNerney said she questioned hand counting as a method for tabulating the votes. "(Hand counting) did not bother us when they came to the same count three times on the first night," McNerney said. "When the board proceeded to count four times with varying results, we questioned that method of counting ballots."

Mistry said he thought Scantrons should be used. "I would like to see Scantrons used," Mistry said. "It eliminates human error." On Feb. 20, the night of the run-off election, the board declared McNerney and Mistry the winners after hand counting the ballots. The board announced that McNerney and Mistry garnered 367 votes to Robbins and Bruce's 365. At the request of Robbins and Bruce, the board re-counted the votes Feb. 21, showing Robbins and Bruce the winners of the election with 367 votes to McNerney and Mistry's 366.

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slippery slope we're starting by funding the class," said Gasperini, who voted not to fund the series. "My argument was not that this program should not be funded, or the merits of the class, but where the money should come from." Speaker Roy Granato said he was glad congress funded the group. "We can't penalize students by defunding this program just because the University is so gracious to give them an hour credit for it," he said.

Although the finance committee recommended that no money go to the Carolina Academic Team, congress appropriated \$200 to the group after Martin Poteralski, the group's president, contended that if more students were aware of the team, more students would be involved. The group had originally requested \$1,600 for travel and lodging for its competitions.

The Elections Board received the funding it requested, but, in light of the hand counting problems of the Senior Class run-off election, a rider was attached to their budget, stipulating that they could not spend student activity fee money on ballots that were not Scantron.

"Not only is that a death sentence for a ton of trees, but it will end up costing congress four times as much as regular ballots," Elections Board Chairwoman Annie Shuart said Monday.

Gasperini said adding riders was a routine procedure in congress. "The election laws are written by congress. It's not like we're using riders for our benefit."

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Orange County back to Guilford County, where the case was originally set to be tried. "Venue was an issue early in this case," Williams said. "The intent was to precede with the matter in Guilford County (as originally planned). It is my position that the state should decide the venue for this case."

Fox said that there was no question about where Mansur was killed. "I think that the issue of where the acts occurred are clear," Fox said. "When they really examined what he was saying about where he dumped the body, it really was in Orange County. The venue properly lies in Orange County."

Battle said he would leave the decision about whether to change the venue up to the trial judge. He also said he would let the

trial judge decide on Williams' motion to sequester jurors during the trial. Edna Tew, Mansur's mother, said she had not expected Goble to plead guilty. "I was not a bit surprised," Tew said. "He did that because of the (possibility of facing) the death penalty." Tew said she would be satisfied if Goble got life in prison instead of the death penalty. "I would be content with a death sentence if he got that," she said. "I would be content if I could get a guarantee that he would get a life sentence and could not get out and kill again." Last fall, Goble pleaded guilty in Greenville, Tenn. to the murders of two other women. Both women were suspected prostitutes who Goble had met at truck stops. Their bodies were found dumped along interstate highways. Goble was sentenced in December to two consecutive life sentences for the killings.

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"I think minority student recruitment is important to this University," Nelson said. "The reason I think it's important that student government support minority student recruitment is that the students of this University show that they are supportive of such a thing and to show this is a hospitable environment for African-American and Native-American students," Nelson

said. Members of congress questioned whether student activities fees could be used to aid high school students who would be attending the following year. A ruling made by Speaker Roy Granato in the fall states that such a use of activity fees would violate the Student Code. Congress voted Sunday to support Granato's fall ruling, however. And after subsequent debate, congress reviewed its decision and voted in support of allocating funds in 1996-97 to go to the recruitment of

talented African-American and Native-American students who would attend the University in the fall of 1997.

"I support minority recruitment and so does the Student Congress," Granato said. Nelson said he wanted the program to convince minority students who had already committed to the University that UNC would be the right choice.

Since Granato was not eligible to vote because of his position, he said he did not know how he would have voted on the issue.
