ETHICS **Bill Pushes for Grade Release**

Many higher education leaders say parents who are paying for their chil-dren's education deserve to be more informed about their children's acade-

mic progress Recently, Ill. Democratic Sen. Denny Jacobs proposed Ill. Senate Bill 1295, which would give undergraduates of Illinois's nine public universities the option of releasing their grades, attendance reports and academic probation

status to their parents. But the bill also matches students' privacy against the parents' right to know about their children's education.

Don Sevener, spokesman for the Illinois Board of Higher Education, said parents deserved to know how their children's education was progressing. "I think the idea is understandable

and even useful because in most cases, parents are paying the bill for their son's and daughter's education," Sevener said.

He also said a student's right to privacy would not be jeopardized because grades would not be released until the student signed a waiver.

"On the other hand, there are priva-cy rights involved, and they are adults, so their rights must be protected," he said.

Brad Burzynski, a Republican in the Illinois Senate, supported the bill. He said it was especially necessary for fresh-men and sophomores to have supervision because college could be overwhelming.

"It's important, because if a parent gets the grades that the kids are making, and they are lower than what they are and they are tower than that any ju-used to, then the parents can exercise some parental authority," Burzynski said. "I believe college students need some encouragement whether their grades are good or bad." While he acknowledged problems

with the proposal, such as dealing with the additional costs and resources,

Burzynski said the bill was beneficial. "The university, without the bill, doesn't have to give grades to the par-ents," he said. "We have higher tuition rates and parents are less informed, so we have to do something." UNC-Chapel Hill does not mail

child's academic performance. Nic Heinke, UNC-CH student body

president, said he could spot a few com-plications that needed to be worked out in the Illinois bill.

He said pressure from parents to force their children to sign the waiver was an issue that should be addressed. But Heinke said the overall idea behind the proposal was useful.

"There are ways to frame the concept that would make it work," he said. "If students choose to release their grades to their parents, then that's their right. But one important clause is that a waiver is signed on a semester-by-semester basis. Burzynski, who helps finance his

child's college expenses, said he strong-ly believed in the concept behind the oposal. "I don't believe this is a partisan

issue," he said. "I fully intend to support the bill because I really believe it's a good idea. I have a junior in college, and I have a daughter who will be a fresh-man next year, so I want to know how they are doing.

WFU will require the members of its institutional review board, which is responsible for approving clinical trials, to take the course as well.

Jeff Cohen, associate director of education at the federal Office for Protection From Research Risks, said recent increases in the volume of research and the complexity of studies meant that review boards had difficulty keeping up with changes in ethical guidelines. He said WFU's training program would help review board mem-bers and investigators catch up.

"I think it's becoming a good trend," Cohen said. "Institutions are looking at
