Torbush Adds to Staff, Will Name Coordinator

North Carolina football coach Carl Torbush named Gunter Brewer as UNC's new wide receivers coach Wednesday.

Brewer, who had coached at Marshall since 1996, will take over the position from Darrell Moody. Moody will coach UNC's running backs next year, a job he did from 1990-95 before becoming receivers coach.

Torbush, the Tar Heels' defensive coordinator for the past 12 years, has scheduled a press conference for this morning to name his new appointee for that position.

Tar Heels Travel South To Tangle With Tigers

The North Carolina women's basketball team takes on Clemson at 7 p.m. in Littlejohn Coliseum.

The Tar Heels (12-10, 4-7 in the ACC) knocked off ACC-leading Virginia 66-63 in overtime Monday behind 24 points from junior point guard Nikki Teasley.

UNC will try to avenge its Jan. 10 loss to the Tigers (15-7, 6-4), a 60-59 decision at Carmichael Auditorium.

UNC Cleans Up Against Fightin' Christians

Members of the grounds crew at Boshamer Stadium used Tuesday afternoon to clear some unmelted ice off the warning track.

It was a good thing they did. The North Carolina baseball team sent Elon's outfielders back to the wall on several occasions Wednesday, blasting three home runs and three doubles as it defeated the Fightin' Christians by two touchdowns, 14-0.

The Tar Heels (4-0), who hadn't played since Jan. 30, were a bit over-anxious at the plate early. They swung at some bad pitches and ended up hitting weak ground outs and pop-ups.

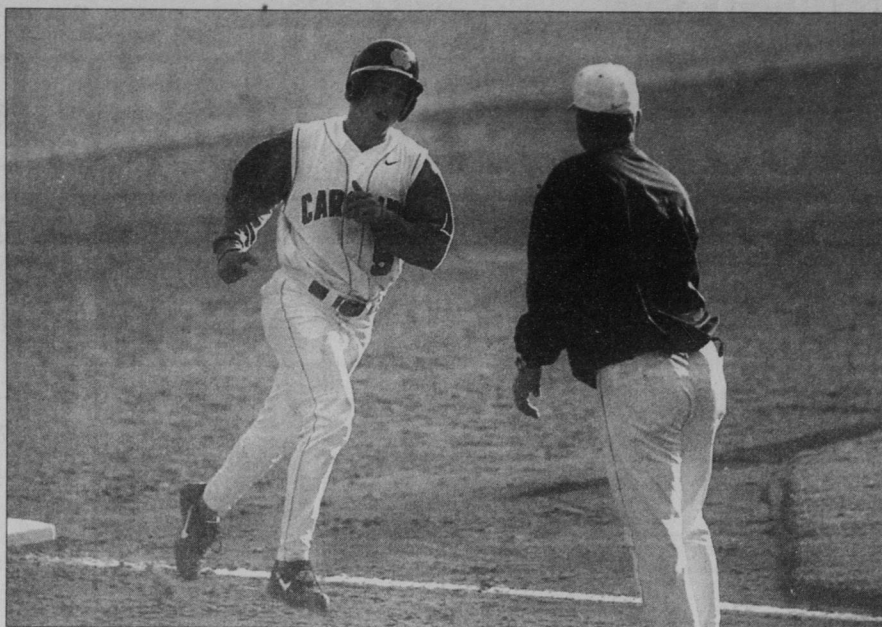
Despite their over-aggressiveness, the UNC batsmen were still able to push a pair of runs across the plate on just two hits in the first four innings.

But in the fifth, the offensive flood-gates opened for the Tar Heels. They scored four runs in three consecutive frames.

"Once we got a couple runs on the board, that allowed us to relax at the plate and hit better pitches," said UNC third baseman Clay Hooper, who went 3-for-5 with four runs batted in.

Hooper hit a three-run homer high into the net behind the left field wall in the bottom of the sixth to make the score 9-0.

On the next pitch, left fielder Tyrell Godwin hit a bomb of his own into

right-center field.

Godwin and catcher Dan Moylan enjoyed good days with the stick. Both players finished with a homer, a double and three runs batted in.

As if it needed it, the North Carolina offense also got some help from the

Elon pitchers. The Fightin' Christians (0-1) walked nine batters and hit two others. Seven of those 11 Tar Heel baserunners eventually scored.

UNC's freshman leadoff man Adam Greenberg drew three walks on the day

and scored four runs.

"Our pitchers sure know that walks can come back to hurt you, so we just try to take advantage of that offensively," Hooper said.

Pitcher Ryan Snare (1-0) was the ben-

eficiary of the offensive outburst. The junior ran into some problems in the first, issuing two walks, a wild pitch and a single to Elon's first four batters.

"I struggled a bit early with my curveball and change-up," Snare said. "I have a great defense behind me, so I wasn't worried too much."

Snare settled down and allowed only one hit the rest of the way. The lefty finished with nine strikeouts in seven innings of work.

"Ryan's a quality pitcher," UNC coach Mike Fox said. "When he throws strikes and gets ahead of guys, he's tough to hit."

"We kind of started a little bit slow offensively, and it gave us a chance to stay in the game until we got a little bit more patient at the plate and broke the game open."

Derrick DePriest pitched the ninth to close out the game and send UNC to its 38th consecutive nonconference home victory. The appearance - DePriest's 92nd in his career - tied him with Tim Kirk (1983-86) for fourth all-time in the Tar Heel record book.
