Peppers' Post Presence Pivotal for Tar Heels

Redshirt freshman forward Julius Peppers has evolved this season from a novelty act into UNC's top reserve.

North Carolina coach Bill Guthridge calls him a "godsend." Forward Kris Lang prefers "specimen." The rest of the Tar Heels are just glad Julius Peppers is one of them.

It wasn't long ago that Peppers, a defensive end for UNC's football team, was being considered a basketball experiment or a gimmick.

That was in December, when the idea of the 6-foot-7, 270 pounder contributing to the No. 2 team in the countributing to the No. 2 team try was about as farfetched as the Tar Heels having to sweat out Selection

Now the question is, what would the

Tar Heels do without Peppers?

"I don't know where we'd be this year with injuries and everything if it wasn't for Pep," UNC forward Jason Capel said. "I'm glad he did come out and stick by us all year. He could have easily been like 'OK, we're losing. I quit." He's playing a huge role for us

A huge role for a huge man. Peppers' size makes him stand out, even among the behemoths of college basketball. No longer is Peppers, who joined the team after it returned from the season-opening Maui Invitational, considered just a

Against Tulsa, Peppers logged 30 minutes, scoring six points and grabbing eight rebounds. He also dished out sists and had two steals.

"I didn't think he'd be able to help us this much," said Joseph Forte, who first

played with Peppers in pick-up games at Woollen Gym. "But our season doesn't go the way it went without Julius."

Without Peppers, it's unlikely that Forte and his teammates would have been answering questions on Tuesday about the Final Four. Peppers' presence allowed Capel to move back to his nat-ural position – small forward – and gave Guthridge flexibility with his front line, especially with Lang battling injuries. Lang, who suffered a sprained ankle

against Tulsa, is listed as day-to-day for Saturday's national semifinal game against Florida

'It's unfortunate that he's having the injuries and having to sit out," Peppers said. "I think he has a lot of confidence

By now, all the Tar Heels have conby how, an the far freets have confidence in Peppers, who played AAU ball with Lang and center Brendan Haywood. In his recruiting efforts, Guthridge saw Peppers and helped the football team recruit him.

Peppers, a redshirt freshman in both sports, emerged on the gridiron this sea-son, leading the team with six sacks. He earned Freshman All-American honors from The Sporting News. Peppers said he decided to play basketball to stay in shape for football. "After basketball season, we'll loan

him to the football team," joked Guthridge, who said he thought Peppers would be playing in the NFL in the

But for now, Peppers is a basketball player, helping Haywood and Lang

control the boards and giving the Tar Heels a chance to prolong their season.

"He brings a rebounding presence that is just amazing," said Haywood, who battles with Peppers in practice. "I sit back and watch the games on TV, and he's like 6-7 and just snatches it from everybody. It doesn't matter if you're 7-foot or 6-11, he just takes it out of your hands."
