
Lower Seeds Play Major Role in UNC Win Streak

UNC's success has been somewhat unexpected following last season's 11-14 finish. But despite suffering their first losing season since 1986, the young Tar Heels were able to gain valuable match experience that Phillips said had been a huge factor in the team's current streak

The return of Phillips from a shoulder injury also has been a key. As a junior in 1998, he was 8-4 at No. 1 singles and fin-

ished the year ranked No. 67 in the nation.

This year, he has returned to that form, posting an 11-3 record at No. 1 singles while being ranked 47th nationally.

Phillips' return, though, is importan for more than just his personal success tion, each member of the team would have to play a spot higher in the lineup.

But Riley pointed out that opportune scheduling had also helped boost the "In the beginning of the season, I had two losses, one at (Texas) A&M and one at Purdue," he said. "I started out win-

ning because we played weaker team Indeed, Brown, Davidson and UNC-Charlotte aren't exactly tennis juggernauts. But the Tar Heels might have really started their streak March 14th, when

they won their fourth straight against a tough South Carolina team. "I think (my personal) turning point was against South Carolina when I won in straight sets," said Riley, who defeated David Nelson 6-2, 6-3 in the Tar Heels' 4-3 triumph.

UNC followed its win in Columbia, S.C., with two dominating wins against Florida State and Wake Forest.

Since then, the Tar Heels have record-

ed 4-3 decisions against Notre Dame, N.C. State and Virginia Commonwealth to run the streak to nine.

And with each win, UNC's confi-

dence continues to grow.
"We looked back and said, 'Wow, we're catching up with everybody,'

Said Riley, "Because our ranking has gone up, we're not doing the hunting anymore – we're the hunted."


