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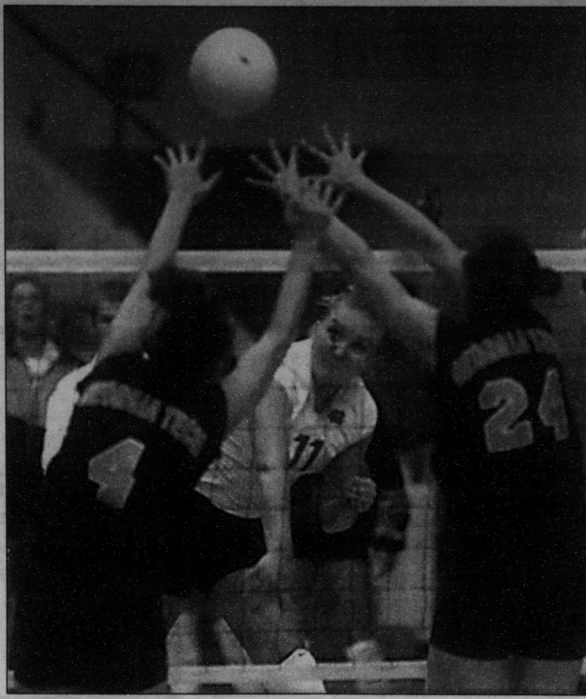
With their newfound intensity, UNC took games three and four with relative ease, sending the match into game five. With momentum fully on their side, the Tar Heels captured the lead and never allowed Tech to come within striking distance, winning the game 15-10 and the match 3-2.

"We knew that it would be hard for Tech to play on the road and sustain momentum," Sagula said. "We began to stay patient and not make as many unforced errors. After we battled back and started serving better, we took the momentum and won the match."

UNC carried that momentum with them into its match with Clemson. The Tar Heels only allowed Clemson to pose a threat only in game two, which UNC won 17-15.

"There's not a better team to beat to start the ACC than Clemson," Krista Buchholz said. "We let the ACC know that we are going to be on our game."

"I think this weekend was continuing our building process," middle hitter Holly Strauss said. "We learned lessons from losses with Houston and Santa Clara, and now we are going to stay consistent and work hard."

Three minutes later, freshman midfielder Maggie Tomecka copied McDonald's effort, putting a similar 25-yarder over Wagner. It was Tomecka's first goal as a Tar Heel; her second came in the 87th minute from a Reddick corner kick.

"We have a substitution pattern now where Maggie starts the second half in place of Leslie (Gaston)," North Carolina coach Anson Dorrance said. "It gives us a different look, a different dimension."

"It was neat seeing Maggie, who I think is going to be a significant player for us, score a couple of wonderful goals."

Florance also contributed to the Tar Heels' offensive output Sunday. After scoring twice Friday to pace UNC past the Tribe, the senior notched her 13th

goal in 11 games this season in the 72nd minute.

Florance moved into a tie with Carrie Serwetyk for 11th place on the Tar Heels' career-goals list with her tally against TCU.

Florance has scored 46 goals in 90 career games at North Carolina.

"She's playing with a ton of confi-

dence, the best I've seen her play since she's been here," McDonald said. "It's fun to play with her."

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Defense Clicks After Bad Start

Led by seniors Lisa Fryer and Liz Feldman, North Carolina's volleyball team entered conference play with one of the best defenses in the league.

It was, however, early defensive miscues that nearly cost the Tar Heels victory in their ACC opener against Georgia Tech on Friday night.

North Carolina suffered defensive errors until the third game of the match, when its defense clicked and facilitated key offensive plays. The strong play carried over to UNC's next ACC match, a 3-0 win against Clemson.

"We knew we would be a team to thrive off our defense," middle hitter Krista Buchholz said. "There's no doubt we have two of the best defensive specialists in the conference in Liz and Lisa. When they're on, they're on."

Despite several serving errors by Georgia Tech early in the first game, the Yellow Jackets amassed a seven-point lead until the Tar Heels rallied on key kills by Nicole Reis and Laura Greene.

Finally, after a 45-minute game in which both teams traded sideouts throughout, the Yellow Jackets capital-

ized on three unforced North Carolina errors to take the game 15-13.

UNC suffered similar lapses in communication on defense in the second game, resulting in Georgia Tech recording seven unanswered points on its way to taking a 2-0 lead.

It was in the third game that, with their ACC opener on the line, the Tar Heels were able to pull together defensively in order to turn the match around in their favor. After taking advantage of Tech serving errors, UNC went on a four-point run to hold on to its lead and the game. The Tar Heels would not look back.

North Carolina's defense then took over, serving as a catalyst for setter Eve Rackham and the offense. The Tar Heels stepped up their level of play at the net by getting their hands on more balls and consistently covering their hitters.

That, in turn, allowed powerful hitters such as Buchholz to take over and force the Yellow Jackets to make errors of their own.

"Our defense was a little off-beat early in the match," Fryer said. "But in the third, fourth, and fifth games, it was our strong defensive play that helped us to win."

The Tar Heels continued their sound

defensive play by converting clean passes and digs into kills and points against Clemson. Throughout the match, the North Carolina defense consistently dug the Tigers' hits, which sparked its own offensive opportunities.

While coach Joe Sagula is pleased with UNC's successful start to the season and the progress the team has made thus far, he is optimistic that they will continue to improve their defensive play.

"We played well enough to win the matches," Sagula said. "We had our ups and downs, though. We want to get sharper."
