

Man Arrested for Shooting Parents in Family Home

The man apprehended by the police in a foot chase was charged with shooting his parents in the head.

Orange County police arrested a man Tuesday morning in connection with shooting his mother and his stepfather in the head at the home the three people shared.

Bryan Lamont Weeks, 24, of 4529 Bumphas Road, was arrested by Orange County Sheriff's Deputy Steve Minton, who responded to a 911 call one of the victims made at 3:16 a.m.

A 911 operator told Minton that the victim who placed the call said the assailant was her son. The caller also said he had fled in a car.

The victims, Susie White Carrington,

Weeks's mother, and Klim McCoy Carrington, both of 4529 Bumphas Road, are listed in critical condition at UNC Hospitals.

As he approached Bumphas Road, Minton observed a vehicle turning right off of Bumphas onto New Hope Road.

The car's driver did not stop for the deputy's blue lights, so Minton pursued the vehicle into the Durham city limits.

After the vehicle blew a tire at the intersection of Avondale and Trinity avenues, the driver stopped the vehicle and fled on foot.

A short chase ensued and Minton apprehended the suspect, later identified as Weeks. He was charged with various traffic violations, soon followed by other charges.

Deputies also found and seized a firearm visible on the floorboard of Weeks's car.

Based on statements made by

Weeks, he was then charged with two counts of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill, inflicting serious injury.

He also has been charged with several traffic charges in connection with the incident.

Weeks made his first appearance in Orange County District Court in Hillsborough Tuesday morning.

He is being held at the Orange County Jail in Hillsborough in lieu of a \$2,010,000 bond.

There is an administrative hearing that is scheduled for May 10 and he has been appointed a public defender, said officials in the district attorney's office.

A crime scene search is currently being conducted by the Orange County Sheriff's Department and the case is under further investigation.

UNC Changes Food Providers

Carolina Dining Services has signed a new contract to provide food and service for the University's dining halls and cafes.

UNC officials have forged a partnership with ARAMARK management services, to begin in August when the University's current five-year contract with Sodexo-Marriott runs out.

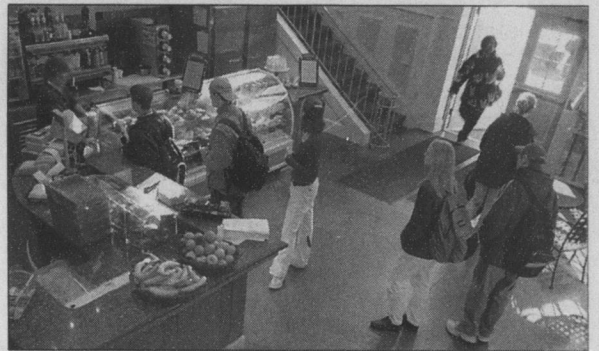
Ira Simon, dining services administrator, said officials signed a 10-year contract with ARAMARK after a 12- to 15-person committee examined bid proposals from ARAMARK, Sodexo-Marriott and Chartwells, another food services provider.

"It's only going to get better," Simon said. "We're very proud of what we've done at Lenoir (Dining Hall). We want to take the level of student satisfaction and bring it to other aspects of campus dining programs, and ARAMARK can do that."

Mike Freeman, general administrator of auxiliary services, said this deal will benefit UNC more financially as well. Whereas the old contract didn't guarantee UNC any profit and required the University to cover all of Sodexo-Marriott's profit losses, the new contract will guarantee gains for UNC.

Under the contract, CDS must pay ARAMARK 2 percent of its sales profits.

In return, ARAMARK gives the University \$500,000 - which will pay

off all remaining debts for the renovation of Lenoir, Freeman said.

If money is left over, UNC will give ARAMARK another 1.5 percent of profits.

And although the University is still responsible for any profit losses, it is guaranteed to reap \$500,000 annually as long as the money comes in.

"We feel it is a better contract than what we had before," Freeman said. "I'm very excited about bringing ARAMARK to campus. They're a very down to earth family, and they have a good reputation."

Simon and Freeman said ARAMARK representatives are discussing

bringing more vendors to UNC's campus, including Subway at Mainstreet Lenoir and South Campus Mini Mart.

They also have talked about bringing a juice bar and smoothie bar to the Student Recreation Center.

Simon said the University was pleased with Sodexo-Marriott's service, but ARAMARK offered more.

He said, "There's a lot of loyalty to Sodexo-Marriott around here - they're a wonderful company. But the committee chose ARAMARK because of what they bring to the table."
