## Sooner Crowd, 'D' Await Tar Heels 'Speechless' Milbrett

Oklahoma's offensive line is a trouble spot for the Sooners, but their defense is among the nation's best.

The Key Matchup: Oklahoma's weakest area might be its offensive line – unfortunately for North Carolina, that isn't really saying much.

Three starters return on the Sooners' line, but junior Josh Smith, who played nine games last season, is a new starter at center, and redshirt freshman Wes

Sims takes over the right tackle spot. It's a small opening for the Tar Heels, but it's one they're going to have to exploit to keep the score respectable.

All-American defensive end Julius

Peppers surely will keep the pressure on junior quarterback Nate Hybl, who Trophy runner-up Josh Heupel.
Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops said last week he would decide whether to adjust

OU's blocking scheme to account for Peppers during practice this week.
"Certainly, he's an exceptional pass

rusher and defensive player, Julius Peppers," Stoops said, "and without question we will pay close attention to

It's almost certain, though, that the Sooners will stick to their usual one-on-one scheme.

But if Peppers starts to do and UNC tackles Ryan Sims and Will Chapman and end Joey Evans get penetra-tion – Oklahoma could have some problems offensively.

UNC place-kicker Jeff Reed is questionable for Saturday's game after spraining his left ankle Tuesday.

"They're not better than us up front," Peppers said. "We've got four of the best linemen in the country

Final analysis/prediction: Jeff Reed was upgraded from doubtful to questionable Thursday and will be avail-able, maybe, for extra points, which could cost UNC a field goal or two.

Reed sprained his left ankle at practice
Tuesday while practicing kickoffs.

But his absence could just make the
score more lopsided, not cost UNC a

North Carolina has talent, but the Sooners are way too deep defensively, and the Tar Heels might never see the red zone, let alone the end zone. Oklahoma linebacker Rocky Calmus and strong safety Roy Williams could be

the best at their positions in the nation.
UNC running back Willie Parker and quarterback Ronald Curry really don't stand much of a chance with a young offensive line in front of them.

And if the sold-out crowd of 72,765 gets to them, it could get ugly.

# Picked WUSA's MVP

BOSTON – When she played on the U.S. national team, Tiffeny Milbrett was frequently overshadowed by Mia Hamm, Brandi Chastain and Briana Scurry. In the WUSA's first season, though,

Milbrett was second to none. The New York Power forward was selected the league's MVP and Offensive Player of the Year on Thursday after scoring a league-high 16 goals and 35 points.

"It leaves you speechless," Milbrett said between practices for the teams that will play in Saturday's champi-

onship game.

The Women's United Soccer Association wraps up its first season Saturday when the Bay Area CyberRays play the Atlanta Beat for the Founders Cup at Foxboro Stadium. Milbrett's Power lost in the semifinals to the CyberRays 3-2, but she was in town for the championship game and to receive her awards, which will be for-


coach of the year; Doris Fitschen of the Philadelphia Charge was chosen Defensive Player of the Year; and LaKeysia Beene of the CyberRays was voted Goalkeeper of the Year.

Milbrett, one of the leading scorers for the U.S. team for several years, played a major role in the Americans' 1999 World Cup title and was the top female player of the year in 2000. But it was only when she got away from the national team that she asserted herself as a leader.

"What I tried to do is lead by example – being a threat for my team. I wasn't too vocal, but I think when the team
needed a push, I was there," she said. "I
think the players need to learn for themselves what it's about, what it means to
be a professional, to be in this league.
"Some of the players have here."

"Some of the players here have never ever been close to something like that. I want them to be successful," she said,

whether they're on my team or not."
Sawyers helped the CyberRays go
11-6-4, no small thanks to Beene, who
had a 0.97 goals against average and a
624-minute shutout streak during the
year. She finished the season with eight
shutouts one more than Scurry shutouts, one more than Scurry.






