### Swimming Competes in Minnesota

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. - The North Carolina women's swimming and diving team defeated Michigan and host Minnesota, and the Tar Heel men split meets with Minnesota and North Dakota in dual meet action at the Minnesota Aquatics Center on Saturday.

The Tar Heel women moved to 2-1 on the season with a 220-148 win against Michigan and a 217-153 victory against Minnesota. The Tar Heels (1-2) men fell to Minnesota 229-141 but topped North Dakota 305-64.

"I was happy to see her so excited to score the tying goal," said UNC coach Karen Shelton. "Abby really has been tremendous this season."

The game continued into sudden-death overtime.

But Deacon Lucy Shaw's penalty-corner goal in overtime left Martin and North Carolina with a disappointing loss.

"(Overtime) is when we should be the most fired up, and I don't think we responded the greatest," Martin said.

The loss ended Martin's chance for her first ACC Tournament title and also marked the fourth-straight year the Tar Heels have fallen in the semifinal round.

And Friday's contest could be the two-time All-ACC performer's final game at Henry Stadium. The NCAA will announce tournament seeding Tuesday.

Despite never winning a conference tournament title, Martin has enjoyed a remarkable career at North Carolina.

Last year the 5-foot-3 back helped lead the Tar Heels to the NCAA title game, which they lost 3-1 to Old Dominion.

But after exerting its energies to tie the game, UNC fell flat in the overtime period and suffered its third OT defeat in as many contests in 2001.

Off a penalty-corner option, Deacon Lucy Shaw blasted the game-winning

After the loss, the Tar Heels will now await word on Tuesday for their seeding in the NCAA Tournament.

The fourth-ranked Tar Heels hope the loss to Wake won't drop the team

The Tar Heels will wait to see if No. 5 Michigan's 3-0 loss in the semifinals of the Big Ten tournament is enough for UNC to maintain its No. 4 ranking. If so, the Tar Heels would take on their NCAA tournament opponents next weekend at home.

Hatchell said, "We still have to know what defense to throw out in what situation."
