Each year, UNC ranks as one of the nation's top public universities and contends for the Sears Cup. It also is the leading seller of collegiate athletic apparel. Quite simply, it is highly visible. Hiring a black head coach would assert the school as a true proponent of diversity and equal opportunity. It would perpetuate the momentum that Notre Dame has created, challenging the rest of the nation's programs to follow suit. "If North Carolina hired an African-American coach in any position, it would be a statement, and it would have to be regarded as the school taking a role in diversity," Matthews said. And then, when young black children in North Carolina and the rest of the country glanced toward our school, they would see a whole new world of possibilities, a new example to strive for. Not a sign reading "No Coloreds."

Tar Heels Shine in Rumble

Brent Calloway took first place in the pole vault, and Ibe Bilaye-Benibo broke two school records Saturday.

It was standing room only. Backpacks, pillows, clothes and bags of food littered the warm-up area inside the Eddie Smith Fieldhouse this weekend. With a number of athletes napping and others resting on collapsible chairs, some areas of the building looked more like a campground than an indoor track. And in between the clutter and sprawled out competitors, spectators chattered, often standing in the middle of walkways, blocking traffic. "You ever see anything like this?" asked an audience member. "It's a zoo." More than 60 different colleges, many of them smaller schools usually not invited to big meets, converged on Chapel Hill for the Blue Heaven Rumble. The two-day, non-team-scor-

ing indoor track meet lasted roughly 20 hours. "We wanted to see if we could put on a meet this size," said North Carolina coach Dennis Craddock. "It was good for our athletes to see a meet like this and be a part of it." But not all of UNC's athletes took part. Craddock rested a few of the team's top performers in preparation for next week's Razorback Invitational at the University of Arkansas, the site of the NCAA indoor championships. Despite the depleted squad, the Tar Heels held their own. Brent Calloway placed first in the pole vault, clearing an NCAA provisional qualifying height of 17 feet, 3/4 inches, an indoor personal best. Just to the left of the pole vault, junior

thrower Ibe Bilaye-Benibo enjoyed the same success as Calloway. Bilaye-Benibo broke UNC's record in both the weight throw and shot put. Her mark in the shot put, 50-6, also provisionally qualifies her for the indoor national championships. "Bigger meets make me a better thrower," Bilaye-Benibo said. The Tar Heels' distance teams also provided North Carolina with a lift. With a time of 4 minutes, 12 seconds, junior Zach Victor placed second in the mile run, while freshman Carol Henry won the women's mile in 4:51. Freshman Erin Donohue followed up last week's victory in the mile with an impressive third leg of the distance medley relay. Donohue, who also ran in the 800-meter, blew by a number of runners, temporarily claiming first place for the Tar Heels. "I was really psyched up," Donohue said. "It was a lot of fun just to get out there and compete."

UNC Swimmers Stroke Past Terps in Easy Road Victory

COLLEGE PARK, Md. - The 21st-ranked North Carolina men's swimming and diving team defeated Maryland 185-106 while the No. 12 UNC women defeated the No. 26 Terrapins 155-138.5 on Saturday. The women (6-2, 3-1 in the ACC) won nine events and the men (4-4, 2-2) won 10 events in compiling their winning margins. Katie Hathaway and Jessi Perruquet were both two-event winners for the Tar Heel women, while Sean Quinn and Justin Donato both won two individual events for the men. The Maryland men dropped to 4-7 overall and 1-4 in the ACC. The Terrapin women fell to 9-2 overall and 3-2 in the ACC.

Gymnastics Places 4th at Ball State MUNCIE, Ind. - The North Carolina gymnastics team finished in fourth place behind 19th-ranked Bowling Green, Illinois-Chicago and

host Ball State with a score of 190.550. The Tar Heels (7-4) excelled on the floor, sweeping the top three places. Sophomore transfer Anna Wilson took first with a 9.875. Sophomore Maddy Curley and senior Monica Middleton finished second and third, respectively. Wilson and Middleton were the only two UNC gymnasts to participate in the all-around. Wilson claimed fourth and Middleton finished fifth.

Women's Tennis Pounds Richmond

The UNC women's tennis team defeated Richmond 7-0 Saturday at Cone-Kenfield Center to improve its record to 2-0 overall. Junior Marlene Mejia held off Richmond's top seed Jeannette Cluskey 6-7, 6-3, 6-1 to help the Tar Heels go 6-0 in singles play. Mejia was recovering from a shoulder injury but returned for her first match since October. Julie Rotondi, Kate Pinchbeck, Kristin Koenig, Aniela Mojzis, and Lee Bairos all defeated their opponents in straight sets. Each doubles tandem also won its match to sweep Richmond.

While Kris Lang carried much of the load in North Carolina's last three losses - in which Jason Capel sat out with a concussion - the weight was much more evenly distributed Sunday, as four Tar Heels scored in double figures.

"It felt good to have almost everybody back," said Jawad Williams, who scored 10 points. "We're still waiting for Jackie, but we're almost 100 percent back."

"We just went out and played the way we're capable of playing."
