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Dr. Ming Wang, a surgeon at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, restored Francisco's vision last year with delicate surgery.
Wang still sees Francisco as a patient and said while he is psychologically doing well, he is suffering some eye trauma that is causing him to lose his sight.
Klein said she hopes funds will be found because the upcoming surgery is even more vital than the first one in putting Francisco back on the road to clear vision.
"This surgery means so much more, for he has now lived with good vision for a year, and for him to have his vision and then lose it again would be extremely difficult," she said.
Klein said all parties involved will keep working until Francisco's sight is restored. "Nobody can quit, and nobody will."
Wang said he and Francisco's family have done their best to keep him upbeat and hopeful. "The whole ordeal has really strengthened his family and teacher relationships. He's hanging in there and his family takes very good care of him."
But Klein said Francisco has a positive attitude and simply accepts his latest loss of vision. "The Serenity Prayer encapsulates Francisco's attitude," she said.
Francisco said he feels fine despite his vision problems. "Last year it was fine because I could see, and now for me it's no different because I've been blind for six years before," he said. "I feel fine."

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N.C. Court Expedites Hearing on Districts

The state Supreme Court did not order a delay of North Carolina's primaries for House and Senate seats.

RALEIGH - The state Supreme Court agreed Tuesday to hold an expedited hearing to determine whether North Carolina's new legislative districts are constitutional.
The court refused, however, to immediately block upcoming elections.
The court will hear arguments in the case April 4, according to an order issued this afternoon.
The court did not lift a stay on a lower court order that would have

forced new legislative districts to be drawn before state House and Senate primaries could be held.
The order was issued in a lawsuit brought by Republican legislators, who challenged legislative districts drawn last fall on the grounds that they split counties.
The GOP legislators say the new state House and Senate plans fail to take into account a provision in the state constitution which forbids counties from being split.
Democrats and lawyers for the state contend the provision is no longer enforceable because the federal Voting Rights Act and federal requirements for proportional representation have superseded it.
In a ruling last week, Superior Court Judge Knox Jenkins found the new

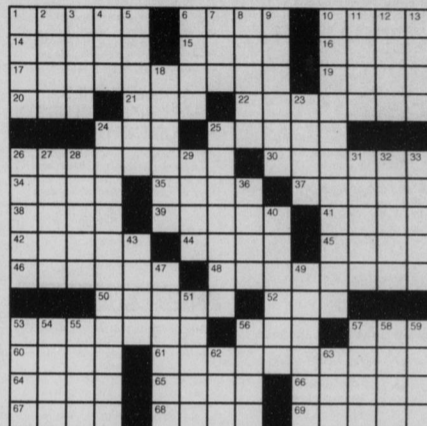
plans unconstitutional, agreeing with Republicans that the federal requirements did not mean legislators should ignore the N.C. Constitution when drawing districts.
Tom Farr, a lawyer for the Republicans who filed the lawsuit, said the order shows the court is serious about preventing unconstitutional elections.
"This is a great ruling. It shows that the Supreme Court is going to go right to the merits of the case," Farr said.
Farr said he was not disappointed the court did not lift Jenkins' stay of his own order and stop the election.
He said the April 4 hearing date will allow the N.C. Supreme Court justices to stop the legislative elections if they agree that the new district plans are unconstitutional.
