

# UNC Power Surge Continues in Win Women's Swimming Grabs National Honors

**Bolstered by 16 hits and four home runs, the UNC baseball team won its 10th straight game Tuesday.**

Following a weekend sweep of third-ranked Florida State, the North Carolina baseball team was primed for a letdown against a struggling Towson team Tuesday.

To prevent his players from looking past the Tigers, UNC coach Mike Fox sent his players an e-mail.

"I had a couple of other things I wanted to say to them," he said. "I don't do that very often. But sometimes it's better that way because each player can read it on their own."

Unfortunately for Towson, the Tar Heels must have paid close attention to whatever Fox wrote.

The Tar Heel bats were lively and the pitchers cruised as UNC rolled to an 18-2 victory at Boshamer Stadium.

Led by third baseman Chris Maples, who was 3-for-4 with two home runs and a career-high seven RBIs, the North Carolina offense knocked three Towson pitchers from the mound.

None of the Towson (9-9-1) pitchers lasted more than 3 1/3 innings against the Tar Heel onslaught.

Starter Rafe Bridges (1-1) gave up nine runs on seven hits, and his control was erratic from the start. He walked the first two UNC batters, throwing seven straight balls at one point. Bridges issued five walks overall.

Bridges was relieved in the fourth by Ray Sausser, who was hit hardest of the bunch. Sausser gave up a home run to

Maples and a double to Chris Iannetta before allowing another four-bagger to Ron Braun. His line for the game: four earned runs on four hits in 2/3 of an inning.

Bridges was replaced by Steve Swiech in the fifth. Swiech fared only a little better, allowing five earned runs in two innings before he was bumped.

Freshman pitcher Justin Baker was finally able to stop the bleeding, throwing two scoreless frames to finish up the game after both teams had cleared their benches.

Freshman righthander Carter Harrell (4-3) started for the Tar Heels (16-8) and was perfect through four before allowing three singles in the fifth. He escaped the jam unscathed and reverted to form in the sixth, retiring the Tigers in order in his final frame.

"I felt good today," Harrell said. "I just had good command of my pitches and I was hitting my spots well. It's hard to hit any pitcher who's hitting his spots."

The Tar Heels jumped to an early lead as four of the first five UNC batters came around to score.

Center fielder Adam Greenberg and shortstop Russ Adams led off the UNC

first with walks, which were followed up by left fielder Sean Farrell's RBI single and a two-run double from Maples. Maples then came around on Chad Prosser's ground out to cap off the flurry.

After a brief break in the second, in which the Tar Heels were retired in order, UNC scored 14 runs during the next four innings to put the game well out of reach. The lead would grow to 18-0 by the end of the sixth.

UNC scored its runs by seemingly every way except the forward pass.

Farrell and DH Ryan Blake scored on sacrifices in the third. But it was the longball that would garner the Tar Heels most of their scores.

Maples, who has hit nine homers in the last ten games, hit his two in consecutive at-bats in the fourth and fifth innings.

"It helps when you're seeing the ball and your swing feels good," he said. "Right now, everything's just kind of clicking for me."

After Braun hit a solo shot in the fourth, right fielder Mell Adams knocked Swiech from the game with a three-run blast in the sixth.

The homers were supplemented by four doubles and a record-breaking triple by Adams, the 15th of his career, setting a new UNC career mark.

Fox was pleased that his team had played so well on both sides of the ball.

"I think it's just that attitude that 'Hey, let's do our job, too,'" he said. "We're scoring some runs, so let's pitch. We're pitching, the offense wants to score some runs."

**Katie Hathaway was named an All-American for the fourth straight year and was honored in seven events.**

Six members of the North Carolina women's swimming team have earned All-America status for 2001-02 based on their performances at last weekend's NCAA Championships in Austin, Texas. All-Americans are named by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

Senior Katie Hathaway won All-America honors for the fourth consecutive year, making her the 17th UNC women's swimmer in history so honored.

Hathaway earned first-team All-America honors this year in the 200-yard breaststroke and was named honorable mention in the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard breaststroke. She also was named honorable mention All-America on four relay teams, all except the 400-yard medley relay.

Sophomore Jessi Perruquet was named first-team All-America for the second straight year. She earned first-team honors in the 200-yard freestyle, and she was honorable mention in the 100-yard freestyle and on five relay teams.

Junior Christy Watkins earned honorable mention honors in the 50- and 100-yard freestyles as well as on all five relay teams. It was the third straight year Watkins has been an All-American.

Sophomore Becky Acker earned honorable mention All-America honors in the 200-yard breaststroke for the second consecutive year. She was also honored for the 400-yard medley relay. Senior Stefanie Rulis has now been an All-American relay swimmer in 1999, 2000 and 2002. This year she was tapped for the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relays. Sophomore Kelly Weeks is a repeat All-America selection from 2001. She was a participant this year on the 200- and 400-yard medley relays and the 800-yard freestyle relay.

**Track's Cvelbar Honored**

UNC's Mike Cvelbar has been named co-winner of this week's ACC Track Athlete of the Week honor. Cvelbar provisionally qualified for the NCAAs in the decathlon at the FSU Relays last weekend with 7,482 points, missing the automatic qualifying mark by 18 points.

Cvelbar shares the honor with the Florida State 4x400 relay team that provisionally qualified for NCAAs with a 3:06.89 at the FSU Relays.

but also created other problems. "The business community expressed major concerns, especially restaurants, complaining that their patrons' access was limited due to the road closures," Evans said.

One option proposes that the town could sponsor a festival similar to Apple Chill or Festfall on Halloween night. Another option suggests town sponsorship of an Octoberfest.

If chosen, the events would be set up in the downtown business district of Franklin Street. "We would like Halloween returned to the community," Evans said. "The people in our community have a right to feel that their

property is safe and so are they when they walk down the street."

Evans said the council is looking to not only protect its citizens but also the well-being of visitors who come to the town on Halloween evening.

The report does raise concerns that if the town attempted to eliminate the event that it would "likely lead to numerous arrests, injuries and property damage" as a result of public backlash.

One option would use the same management plan used last year, while another would reinstate the plan used before 2001. A similar option would add some traffic and crowd control regulations to the pre-2001 plan. Attempting to relocate the event from the down-

town area to Homestead Park, Kenan Stadium and other locations is another of the options the town has developed.

A public forum will be held April 22 to allow citizens to voice their opinions on the proposed planning options for managing Halloween.

"In a couple of years, Halloween is going to be falling on the weekend, and that will draw larger and larger crowds," Evans said. "This is something that needs to be dealt with as soon as possible before it gets out of hand, and we cannot protect people in the community or people in the crowd."

Willett said the new Cabinet members are "true Carolina fans" who will work to meet her platform goals.

"The people selected were those with the best team philosophy," she said.

Now that Cabinet positions have been assigned, Willett's team plans to get a head start on fall athletics event planning. "We are in the process of dividing responsibilities among the executive Cabinet, deciding how to go about meeting our goals," Willett said.

Willett said many of her campaign promises are already taking shape, including negotiations to put a large video screen in Kenan Stadium.

"Right now I'm meeting with officials, administrators, getting the OK and setting dates," she said. "And we are already inviting people to be on the Homecoming advisory committee."

New Special Projects Director Michael Tompkins said the Cabinet will incorporate new ideas into veteran programs. "We're looking to improve on old ideas, like the Hooker 5K, while also building on new ones, like 'Answer the Bell with Bunting.'"

CAA also is taking steps to improve its relationship with other athletic groups. "Right now, CAA and (the Intramural Recreation Department) don't have a lot of interaction, and we want to work on building that relationship," Willett said.

Overall, Willett said she is confident that CAA is on the right track. "A lot of ideas are going into action this school year," she said. "You can't really see the effects of our work yet, but you will."
