Grabs National Honors

Katie Hathaway was named an All-American for the fourth straight year and was honored in seven events.

Six members of the North Carolina women's swimming team have earned All-America status for 2001-02 based on their performances at last weekend's NCAA Championships in Austin, Texas. All-Americans are named by the College Swimming Association of America.

Senior Katie Hathaway won All-America honors for the fourth consecutive year, making her the 17th UNC women's swimmer in history so honored.

Hathaway earned first-team All-America honors this year in the 200-yard breaststroke and was named honorable mention in the 200-yard individual medley and the 100-yard breaststroke. She also was named honorable mention All-America on four relay teams, all except

the 400-yard medley relay.

Sophomore Jessi Perruquet was named first-team All-America for the second straight year. She earned first-team honors in the 200-yard freestyle, and she was honorable mention in the 100-yard freestyle and on five relay teams.

Junior Christy Watkins earned honorable mention honors in the 50- and 100-yard freestyles as well as on all five relay teams. It was the third straight year

Sophomore Becky Acker earned honorable mention All-America honors in the 200-yard breaststroke for the second consecutive year. She was also honored for the 400-yard medley relay. Senior Stefanie Rulis has now been an Senior Stefanie Rulis has now been an All-American relay swimmer in 1999, 2000 and 2002. This year she was tapped for the 200- and 400-yard freestyle relays. Sophomore Kelly Weeks is a repeat All-America selection from 2001. She was a participant this year on the 200- and 400-yard medley relays and the 800-yard freestyle relay.


