able housing for University employees.

Alderman Diana McDuffee said Szostak is the first to take advantage of the affordable housing incentives entailed in the town's most recently passed development ordinance.
But McDuffee said the percentages

stipulated by the development ordinance could be adjusted through measures that encourage developers to provide more affordable housing.

"We can't require developers to build affordable housing, but we can encourage diversity of housing by giving bonuses to developers that build affordable housing," McDuffee said.

The bonus for developers who agree to incorporate affordable housing is an increased quota of houses that they are

allowed to build.

The bonus policy allows a builder to construct smaller, more affordable houses, which saves money for the

Carrboro Town Manager Robert Morgan said he is optimistic about the

new development.
"The negotiations are still going on, and there are no plans cemented.
"But it looks like a good balance."

The officials pointed to many state programs established to further the edurogram sesanismed to further the edu-cation of residents, including the N.C. Teaching Fellows Program. The pro-gram funds college scholarships for four years for students who plan to become -state teachers.

JoAnn Norris, associate executive director of the program, said 400 out of more than 2,000 applicants were selected this year for scholarships.

Norris said there are many benefits to the programs. "Teaching Fellows are in a school by second semester learning about the culture of schooling," she said. "This is the strongest advantage of preparation. They have four years of college to learn about it. They have to college to learn about it. They have to be adapted to teach the skills."

Don Bailey, director of the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Institute, said many students are not adequately prepared for kindergarten. "Unfortunately

Rand said the UNC system will always be forced to make substantial fis-cal decisions because of the caliber of its professional schools. "We have the competing interests of money to keep the pro-grams competitive on a level versus keeping the university balanced," he said. Warwick said he thinks there is little to

no data that could support the arguments

of UNC-CH's professional schools.
"We'll certainly listen to what they're
if anyone submits anything that

we'll ceramy fisten to what they re-saying if anyone submits anything that shows our schools aren't competitive with comparable quality schools," he said. Warwick also noted that financial aid for students will total more in 2002 than ever before. "I doubt that based on my ever before. "I doubt that based on my personal knowledge they would be able to show that we aren't competitive at this time," he said. "We don't believe we're pricing ourselves out of the market."
