In the history of its program, the North Carolina volleyball team has never gotten past the second round of

the NCAA Tournament. This year, UNC expects that to

change. "This year's squad is better. That's the bottom line," said outside hitter Malaika Underwood. "We have a good seed, really motivated. So those three things together, we have a great opportunity to do something special."

The statistics back her up. No. 14 North Carolina's winning per-centage of .909 is the highest in school his-tory. UNC (30-3) has hovered between 11 and 15 in the polls for most of this season. The previous high for an ACC team was 13, set by Clemson in 1999. Outside hitter Laura Greene, voted

the ACC player of the year, is the first Tar Heel to record 1,500 digs and 1,500 kills in her career. She was named to the all-ACC first team, along with setter Eve Rackham, who is second in career assists. Sophomore Molly Pyles was named to the all-ACC second team.

However, all of the individual and accolades could not prevent the Tar Heels from losing to Florida State in the second round of the ACC Tournament two eekends ago. But after a tune-

goal – winning an NCAA title. "Just because we lost ACCs doesn't mean we can't go far in the tourna-ment," Underwood said. "To tell you the truth, having a NCAA banner is way more prestigious than having an ACC championship banner. We like our seed, and we think that we have a good chance of getting a banner up there." UNC is seeded third in the central

egion of the bracket and 11th overall. When tournament play begins on Thursday, the first obstacle in North Carolina's way is Winthrop (28-10), winner of the Big South conference cham-

pionship. "We're looking at a team that won their conference, so their feeling positive, they're successful, they're a win-ning team," said UNC coach Joe Sagula. "Any team you play is coming here with a winning season, and they're going to be dangerous."

Sagula said that his team has been watching tape of the Eagles and is wary of Winthrop's outside hitters, Mary Hock and Jennifer Pritchard, who have very contrasting styles.

Controlling the outside hitters and also the tempo will be key for the Tar Heels. It is something that they could not do in their loss to the Seminoles, when Florida State's Erica Bunch and Kristin Frye dictated the pace of the game. As a result, the Seminoles broke down UNC's typically strong defense. The team believes that a repeat per-

formance is not in the cards.

"We expect to win," Greene said. "We don't expect to go home in the first round the way we have since I've been here. I think that's a huge change in the mindset of the program.

Volleyball Aims for Better Banner Elder Illinois Takes Over **Against UNC in 2nd Half**

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. - Illinois seniors Brian Cook and Sean Harrington were too much for North Carolina's talented freshmen.

Cook scored 22 points and Harrington had a career-high 20 as the 25th-ranked Illini ran past No. 12 North Carolina in the final eight min-utes Tuesday night and beat the Tar Heels 92-65 in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge Challenge.

Illinois (4-0) led 64-57 with 7:42 left and then took off, outscoring the Tar Heels 28-8 while sending UNC (5-1) to its first loss. North Carolina was coming off a championship in the Preseason NIT after defeating then-No. 2 Kansas in the semifinal game and Stanford in the final.

In a game featuring talented first-year players – North Carolina started three freshmen and Illinois two – the Illini's experience made the difference down the stretch.

Harrington shot 7 of 9 from the field, including 6 of 8 from the 3-point line, to give the Illini the boost they needed. Cook was 8-of-12 from the field and had eight rebounds and added five

under 13 minutes left May, with his father, former Indiana

star Scott May, watching from a seat several feet behind the Tar Heels' bench, then brought North Carolina

He worked inside and made three free throws and an easy layup to cut the lead to 58-52 with just under 10 minutes

to go. But Harrington, Luther Head and then Cook hit 3-pointers in a twominute span, spurring a 15-6 spurt as the Illini broke away to stay, taking a 79-63 lead with four minutes left. UNC never

regained its composure. Harrington's 3-pointer and Head's spectacular dunk on a lob pass from Brown in the final two minutes of the first half helped the Illini take a 40-36

Things didn't look so bad from the start for the North Carolina. The Tar Heels didn't let the rowdy crowd at Assembly Hall rattle them and jumped

out early in the game to lead 11-3. Illinois finally caught up as Harrington's first 3-pointer gave the Illini their first lead, at 19-17, and they ent on to build a late eight-point lead. North Carolina rallied and evened

the game on a 3-pointer by Jonathan Holmes before Illinois went up four at the half. As the final minute wound down, Illinois fans chanted, "Overrated," referring to North Carolina's No. 12 ranking released Monday

Tar Heel coach Matt Doherty told his team, which hadn't experienced a loss

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
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yet this season, that there will be days like this.

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Peppers Suspended for Rest of Season

CHARLOTTE - Star rookie defensive end Julius Peppers of the Carolina Panthers was suspended Tuesday for the final four games of the season for violat-

ing the NFL's substance abuse policy. Peppers' agent, Marvin Demoff, told the league Tuesday morning that he was withdrawing an appeal of the suspen-sion. Demoff said last month that the league told him Peppers tested positive for a banned substance in a dietary supplement

"It's disappointing for me, the Panthers

and the fans and everybody," Peppers said in a conference call Tuesday afternoon. "I wish I could finish the season I'm just going to get over it and come back next year and be even stronger." The 22-year-old defensive lineman ranks third in the NFL with 12 sacks but

will end his season short of Jevon Kearse's rookie record of 14 1/2. He will be eligible to play in the Pro Bowl if selected. "Obviously when you lose a player of

his caliber and it is disappointing," Panthers general manager Marty Hurney said. "But we've known this was a possibility for a few weeks. So we're

not surprised by it." Demoff wouldn't say what supple-

"We didn't not want the suspension to affect some of the 2003 season," Demoff said. "Julius did not want to do
