the terrorist attacks Sept. 11, 2001. Although the speakers at the meeting did not discuss the possibility of an attack on the UNC campus or a biological incident at the labs, UNC officials have analyzed the possibility of attacks and have

implemented preventive measures.

"If it is a known attack, we would respond, we would contain the area and we would quarantine the people necessary, said Peter Reinhardt, director of UNC's Department of Environment, Health & Safety. But Reinhardt said he has com-

plete confidence in the safety of the UNC labs and does not foresee any possible biological incidences. "Any facility we have using those kind of toxins are secure; they have very little access, and there is a screening of people getting in," he said. "I have confidence all those areas are secure.'
