way shall prevail over violence and hatred in the end."
Rabbi Sharon Mars from N.C. Hillel also said she hopes religious conviction will further peace efforts.
"May we see soon signs that the peace created through each of our holy actions has indeed emanated

outward, touching all of humankind," she said.
But ultimately education will be most important in fostering both peace and tolerance, said Dave Gilbert, assistant dean of students.
"We're all here at the University to engage in the discovery of knowledge and truth."

vacancies already exist on Franklin Street and that the cost of installing sprinkler systems would not help. "Installation is not a cost a small-business man can take," he said.
The resolution would affect about 100 businesses and would cost each business anywhere between \$50,000 and \$80,000, officials said.
Ralph Karpinos, Chapel Hill's town attorney, said Rep. Verla Insko, D-Orange, already introduced a bill to the N.C. House regarding the sprinkler systems. But the town wants to study the issue before endorsing it.
Mark Sherburne, general manager for the Siena Hotel, added

that the council should look at other ways to compromise, such as increasing the amount of inspections from the fire department.
Resident Fred Meier said that instead of making small businesses spend more money for installation, people should just be more sensible, for example, by not using flammable materials, such as those used in the Rhode Island club.
"We can't legislate against stupidity," Meier said.
Mayor Kevin Foy said he personally would benefit from further analysis by the town before taking action to prepare legislation.
Foy said, "If we take some action, it's going to be a long process."

Most restaurateurs seem hesitant to take any political stance for fear of excluding customers.
Employees are "pro-troops" at Top of the Hill, said manager Michael Baleno. Otherwise, they are taking no political stance, he said. "We're an open forum."
After Sept. 11, Top of the Hill was criticized for a pro-American banner reading "God Bless America, Woe to Our Enemies" that hung above Franklin Street. It

was taken down because of a sign ordinance.
"I just put up my own expression, and unfortunately a lot of other people made that into a stance," said owner Scott Maitland, a Gulf War veteran. "I think only in Chapel Hill would my banner have been controversial."
Although he thinks Ham's employees' gesture was in poor taste, Les Stewart, a graduate student who received the e-mail, said he doesn't plan to boycott the place.
Some students, however, said they would not go to Ham's again.

Nixon, a weapon systems consultant to Athena Research and Consulting LLC. "The new missiles can come within 10 yards."
He said the global positioning system now employed by the military is safer than the laser designators that primarily were used during the Persian Gulf War.
Nixon said the GPS allows aircraft to "fire and forget" — launch missiles and then drop below the horizon. "This ability makes launching missiles with GPS safer than hovering close to the target."
Victoria Samson, research asso-

ciate at the Center for Defense Information, said missile technology has improved from 7 percent accuracy during the Persian Gulf War to 90 percent today.
Stephen Cymbala, a professor of political science at Pennsylvania State University, said new electronics attached to missiles have dramatically increased their capabilities by creating "smart bombs."
"The smart bomb is self-correcting, and its course is flexible," he said. "This is especially helpful in the Iraqi desert."
But advanced technology is not without its drawbacks, experts say.
Nixon said one of the problems with new technology has been mak-

ing it less sensitive to environmental variables, especially in the dusty environment of the Iraqi desert.
"Hardening electronics will help prevent damage from temperature change and transport," he said.
Cymbala said the ultimate extent of damage caused by a bomb depends on the warheads attached to the missile and the area it hits.
He said a country must not depend upon technology alone because technology always has a chance of fallibility. "The side with the best technology does not always win."

very involved in disaster planning," he said. "The goal for us has always been to be ahead of the game."
Weber explained that preparation for any biological emergency at hospitals dates back to before the terrorist attacks Sept. 11, 2001.
Although the speakers at the meeting did not discuss the possibility of an attack on the UNC campus or a biological incident at the labs, UNC officials have analyzed the possibility of attacks and have implemented preventive measures.
"If it is a known attack, we would respond, we would contain the area and we would quarantine the people necessary," said Peter Reinhardt, director of UNC's Department of Environment, Health & Safety.
But Reinhardt said he has complete confidence in the safety of the UNC labs and does not foresee any possible biological incidences. "Any facility we have using those kind of toxins are secure; they have very little access, and there is a screening of people getting in," he said. "I have confidence all those areas are secure."

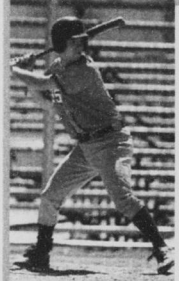

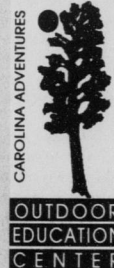
