voice on campus. Topics such as stipends for teaching assistants, child care and insurance were given greater attention under Page's administration.

Willett's CAA tenure marred by indecision, lack of planning **REPORT CARD** COMMENTS ISSUES Campuswide e-mails helped keep stu-dents aware of CAA events, and the instant replay board is near completion, although plans for the board already were in place before her election. Willett failed to add the South Campus ticker. Boost fan participation in all sports and advocate for instant replay board in Kenan Stadium and a sports ticker on South Campus. Basketball distribution did improve by pushing the starting time back. But Willett failed to adequately respond to questions about the fairness of block seating at football games. Improve system for ticket distributions to ensure that all students have a fair chance.

Willett created a Cabinet-level posi-tion specifically charged with address-ing IM and rec concerns. Plans to install new nets for outdoor courts never mate-rialized, and leaders did not adequate-ly respond to closed field space. Better promote intramural and recre-ational sports through offering better facilities and equipment. CAA leaders are in talks to land a corporate sponsorship with Coca-Cola to expand the group's activities and cut back on time spent fund raising.
