S tudent Congress would like to welcome everyone back for yet another great year at Carolina.

Since 1938, Carolina has had a student legislature, and we are proud to carry on this long and rich history of student self-governance

Student Congress is the legisla-tive branch of student government. We are a nonpartisan, unicameral body comprised of 40 members with one constituency — the students.

Each spring, undergraduate and graduate students are elected in accordance with the election laws set forth by the Student Code and the Board of Elections to serve a one-year term.

Periodically throughout the year, special elections are held to fill vacant seats.

Once elected, members are placed on one of three perma-nent standing committees in which bills and resolutions normally originate, are heard, amended if necessary and either fail or are passed on to the full Congress to act upon.

Full Congress meetings take place every other Tuesday and are open to all students as well as the public. So what do we do?

As the legislative branch of student government, Student Congress seeks to serve as the voice of the student body by delegating and amending laws per-taining to the University and its constituents. Student Congress also takes

an active role in preserving the relationships between students and administration. In doing this we take a part in furthering the success of the University and the communication among all that must occur in order to take part in upholding the pride and legacy of this institution.

In addition, it is the responsibility of Student Congress to allo-cate a large portion of the student activity fee to officially recognized


Senior Class Gift
