dropping like flies, and it was actually very difficult to play against the wind."

Winget had some big saves in the first half as the Broncos took full advantage of the wind at their backs and applied full pressure. On one Santa Clara shot, Winget had to dive and stretch to her full height to make the last-second save.

"It was just great for Aly to make a huge save in the first half," said teammate Catherine Reddick. "She outstretched beautifully. I would have given her a 10 on that save."

Winget's aggressiveness as a keeper could be seen when she came out of the goal mouth to stop a Bronco breakaway. The two players collided, and Winget didn't get

"I think this is a big confidence booster, and it will definitely give us momentum going into the final four knowing we beat our rivals in our revenge factor," Winget said.

Winget had a quiet second half since most of the play occurred at

Santa Clara's end of the field. The Broncos were the toughest opponent thus far for the Tar Heels in the tournament. The victory set up a rematch with UCLA, a team the Tar Heels already defeated this season.

"I think we do have the potential to win the championship," Winget said. "It's just a matter of if we come up for the games and come together."

"I think we're a very good team this year, and I'm excited."

port," Tarpley said. "I got lucky and won the ball. And I looked up and Heather was perfectly placed in the box, and I found her."

According to O'Reilly, though, "It wasn't luck. She's a smart player."

The Tar Heels' next goal came in the final minute before the half. Anne Felts was fouled just outside

the Bronco box, and her free kick found Catherine Reddick, who headed the ball into the back of the net to give UNC a halftime edge of 2-0.

In the second half, North Carolina had the wind to its back and the momentum. In the 80th minute, Alyssa Ramsey chased a Bronco defender down the sideline and stole the ball.

With the defender hot on her

heels, Ramsey passed the ball into the box where Tarpley redirected the ball into the lower corner of the net for the final UNC goal.

"Even though the 3-0 is what is left on the board, I didn't really feel like we deserved to be that much ahead, certainly at the half because of the wind condition and Santa Clara's pressure," Dorrance said. "But still, I think our kids fought hard, and the other thing I told the players after the game is that this is a real team victory."

The Tar Heels played most of the game without starters Carmen Watley and Maggie Tomecka and reserve Elizabeth Guess, who were all battling the flu. Freshman Jessica Maxwell, though, returned for the first time since injuring her knee on Oct. 26 to play a key role in UNC's victory.

However, the victory was bitter-sweet for the Tar Heel seniors since it was the last game they would ever play at Fetzer Field.

"The last two years, they've been the team to knock us out of the tournament," Reddick said. "And we knew that they're a great team and they're going to do everything in their power to knock us out again."

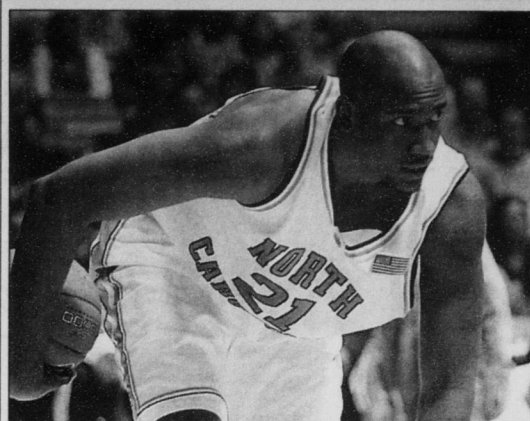

worked this week on keeping the ball alive on plays just like the one Jawad Williams made.

"It's the little things that are big," the coach said. "We showed tapes of it during the week. He did a good job there. A little play like that gets awfully big in a game like this."

The Vikings, who dropped to 1-22 all-time vs. AP Top 25 teams, went 9-for-27 on 3-pointers. They missed their final five from behind the line — and a chance at one of the biggest wins in school history.

"There's no satisfaction in going out and playing close," said Garland, hired in April after Rolie Massimino resigned. "We didn't come here to play close, we came to win."

North Carolina was in control early, bolting to a 29-16 lead in the first half when the Vikings suddenly found their outside range and confidence.

Victor Morris hit a 3-pointer and freshman Patrick Tatham made two free throws as Cleveland State used an 11-0 run to take a 35-33 lead with 2:43 left in the half.

Two free throws by Jawad Williams put UNC back up by two,

but Coles hit a 3-pointer with 49 seconds left and Walt Chavis banked in a 3 with four seconds left as the Vikings took a stunning 41-37 halftime lead.

The Tar Heels got a scare midway through the opening half when Felton and teammate Jackie Manuel were injured on the same play. Felton was trying to draw a charging foul on Westley, and when the two collided and fell in the lane, an unsuspecting Manuel was whacked on the left knee.

Felton returned a few minutes later, but Manuel suffered a sprained knee and did not come back.

"We missed him," Roy Williams said. "He's a guy we can count on."
