Nyenhuis' serve powers UNC to win

Dani Nyenhuis pounded a serve across the net, and it appeared that it would sail to the back line, but instead it dropped right above the front line.

The Duke players seemed con-fused, to say the least. With superb serves and domi-

nating defense this past weekend, Nyenhuis helped the North Carolina volleyball team sweep Duke 3-0. Nyenhuis also recorded a careerhigh 25 digs in the match Friday. The team switched its typi-

cal defensive alignment against Duke. After some extensive scout-ing, Coach Joe Sagula noticed that Duke tends to kill the ball short.

With the new defense, Nyenhuis and fellow outside hitter Molly Pyles

had several more digs than usual. And with sophomore outside hitter Meg Eckert still out with an ankle sprain, Nyenhuis and Pyles got most of the offensive oppor-tunities. Nyenhuis contributed 13 kills, recording her 12th double-

double of the season. Nyenhuis shined in several ways in the Duke match. With North Carolina leading 24-23 in game two, Nyenhuis leapt above the right side of the net and stuffed a Duke hitter's shot for a solo block.

The point was crucial, as the squads traded points the rest of the way before UNC won by two. The team focused on serving all

week, so where Nyenhuis really stood out was in her service game.

Unlike the rest of her teammates, Nyenhuis serves the ball from deep behind the endline. Instead of standing right on the endline like most players, Nyenhuis serves from the basketball baseline — several feet farther from the net.

"I've been so bad at (serving) for the last six years of my life, so Coach is like, 'Go back there and just hit it as hard as you can,' Nyenhuis said.

She also said that if she stood on the endline, she would be afraid of overhitting the ball.

"It was more like a mental thing for me," she said. "When I left it short, it was too much to think about."

Nyenhuis had two streaks of three or more straight points on her serve Friday. "She's got a great serve, and

the way she serves, sometimes it's the way she serves, sometimes its really going to be on, and (Friday) it was on," Sagula said. Should Nyenhuis' serve continue to be on, her team can only benefit.

"It's like a knuckleball, and that's what you want, because it's going to

go deep, high, long," Sagula said. "The farther we can get her to move back there, the more it can move around. (Duke) was really struggling back there — like the catcher for the Red Sox."
