Tar Heels went scoreless for nearly seven minutes in regulation and overtime and missed their last seven shots in the second half - including three in the last 35

The win snapped FSU's six-game losing streak against North Carolina (14-3, 2-2), which won 15 of the previous 16 meetings.

Hodges' three-point play with 1:53 left in the second half tied it at 64, and neither team scored again until overtime. North Carolina's La'Tangela Atkinson was short on a 3-pointer that could have won it is the clock ticked down.

Freshman Erlana Larkins scored 21 and Camille Little added 17 for the Tar Heels. Atkinson finished with 16 points and 11 rebounds.

The Seminoles pulled even at 37 heading into halftime when

Adeduntan, who scored 16 in the first half, hit a tying 3 from the right corner with less than 22 seconds left.

North Carolina outscored the Seminoles 44-28 in the paint, but shot 17 fewer free throws.

If the Hurricanes hope to spring an upset on North Carolina, they'll have to get sig-nificant production from their backcourt.

Diaz scored 25 points against Duke on Wednesday, but that

effort came on 11-of-23 shooting. He'll have to make better use his opportunities against No. 6 North Carolina on Saturday night.

Manuel won't give Diaz many open looks, and the sophomore likely will have to rely on Anthony Harris and Robert Hite — the other two starters in Miami's three-guard lineup — to hit shots and create space.

But when opponents force Miami to pass the ball, they expose perhaps its greatest weak-

The Hurricanes have averaged just 12.63 assists per game this season, good for worst in the ACC, and only two regulars boast an assist-to-turnover ratio greater than 1.0.

In contrast, the Tar Heels are averaging 21.47 assists per game as well as 11.06 steals per game. Both marks set the pace for the conference

Final Analysis/Prediction: The Hurricanes have put together a surprising run in their first year in the conference, and Frank Haith would receive serious consideration for ACC Coach of the Year honors if the season ended

But that doesn't mean Miami has a realistic chance to knock off a North Carolina team, especially one that played an ugly game at Clemson on Wednesday and still

And if Miami can't defend the paint better than it did against Duke, when Blue Devil power forward Shelden Williams poured in 30 points and snagged seven rebounds with little resistance, it could get ugly.

Swimmers to take on Cavaliers

Rivalry remains one of the greatest motivators in all of sports.

The North Carolina swimming and diving teams will need that motivation Saturday when they face Virginia in what could be their most challenging meet of the sea-

Last January, Virginia man-handled the UNC men in an over-whelming 211-89 victory.

The UNC women survived tough competition and came out of last year's meet with a solid 171-129 win on the shoulders of former NCAA champion Jessi Perruquet, who graduated in May. She post-ed three individual victories and anchored the 200 individual medley team that took first place for the Tar Heels.

"There is a big rivalry in these meets with Virginia," said Coach Frank Comfort.
Despite last year's devastating

loss, the men's team comes into the meet with increased confidence after notching several major victories so far this season, including a stunning 174-126 win against No. 13 Georgia on Oct. 13. The win marked the team's first against the Bulldogs

Virginia, who is No. 10 in the national polls.

UVa. swimmers Frank Crippen and Luke Wagner, who caused much of the damage to the Tar Heels last year, return to a lineup that Comfort admits is a formidable one.

"UVa. has a superb men's team across the board," Comfort said.

As opposed to last season, when the Tar Heels came into the Virginia meet with a 5-4-1 record in dual meets, UNC this season stands at No. 19 in the polls with an impressive 8-1 record in dual

Senior captain Reid Owen will look to lead the team with another consistent performance in the 500-, 1,000- and 1,650-yard freestyles. Freshman diver Ben Herboth has garnered numerous first place finishes this season and is looking for more against the Cavaliers.

The rivalry also remains strong between the No. 15 UNC and No. 16 UVa. women's teams. The Tar Heels have a 7-1 record in dual events this season, compared to the Cavaliers' 8-0 record.

Although Perruquet provided much of the force behind last year's win, UNC's Lizzy Bruce and Emily Carroll have had ample experience with Virginia. Both were crucial in last year's competition as Bruce took first in the 100 and 200
