After years of renovations, those who shop and those who sell at University Square say they are excited to see the projects nearing completion.

Recent construction projects at the Franklin Street retail spot are a part of the owner's original vision to transform the center into a concentrated array of merchants catering to Chapel Hill's eclectic demographics.

Construction is about 80 percent complete, Moshier said — the sidewalks will be finished in about six weeks, and new signs will be done in about a month.

Pam Patterson, a long-term employee of women's clothing store Fine Feathers, is looking forward to a boost in business in the wake of renovations. "Business is wonderful, but it can always be better.

Month targets sexual violence

On the heels of a recent downtown rape, local advocates hope to use the next month to raise awareness of sexual violence

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and the Orange County Rape Crisis Center has several events planned to bring attention to the problem.

Chapel Hill Police Department domestic violence and sexual assault specialist Sabrina Garcia said 41 cases of sexual assault have been reported this year.

That number includes incidents ranging from sexual assault and rape to indecent exposure and

secretly peeping, she said.
Eight of the incidents were reported rapes.

But not included in that figure is the number of incidents that go unreported.

Sexual violence is one of the most underreported crimes," said Krista Park, community response director at the center.

"The numbers really don't reflect how often the events can

with the Carolina Women's Center and Advocates for Sexual Assault Prevention during Women's Week, which began Monday.

An ongoing event is the Clothesline Project, a national project that will display T-shirts with messages illustrating the effects of sexual violence at locations throughout the community.

Some of the T-shirts are on display in the Student Union, bearing messages such as: "You were eighteen. I was fifteen. I said NO, But you called yourself a man.'

"(Making the shirts) makes the issues of violence and how people feel about it come to life," said Diane Kiervik, director of the women's center.

Margaret Barrett, executive director at the rape crisis center, said the public cannot turn a blind

eye to the issue. "The fact is that sexual violence is happening," she said. "It's a difficult issue for people to talk about, but we need to break the silence so we can create an environment where people can come forward, know they're not alone and it's not their fault.
