UNC stabs Lancers in big win Stepheson adds to talented class

For one brief moment it looked like underdog Longwood had stunned the North Carolina men's soccer team with an early opening goal

Hughes played his first minutes in goal all year in place of senior Ford Williams and faced only five shots, recording his seventh career shutout.

"We haven't given him time yet, and it was his time today," said UNC coach Elmar Bolowich. "He played a full 90 minutes, and I'm glad he did. And I'm glad he had a shutout."

Hughes, who admitted to being a little nervous before the game, made only one save — but it was

a big one. "At the point, it was somewhat critical because we ended up scor-ing on the next play," Hughes said. And that play happened 28 sec-

Forward Alex Stepheson gave

a verbal commitment Tuesday to play basketball at North Carolina, a decision that solidifies Roy Williams' 2006 recruiting class as one of the best in the country. Stepheson, who is ranked as the

No. 58 prospect in the nation by Scout.com, will provide frontcourt depth when he arrives in 2006-07 and is another piece in an increas ingly impressive puzzle.

"He is an excellent comple-mentary post player to what they already have," said Dave Telep, national recruiting director for Scout.com. "He has a big, strong, **SPORTS CALENDAR** TODAY

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Stepheson followed in the footsteps of fellow Californian Deon Thompson, who committed to North Carolina last week. Thompson is ranked as the No. 22 recruit in the country, and Telep said he and current freshman Tyler

Hansbrough should be the founda-tion of UNC's post game next year. The addition of the 6-foot-9 post player lessens the blow somewhat for Roy Williams' staff of the loss of blue-chip center Spencer Hawes, who recently picked Washington instead of UNC. The seven-footer is ranked No. 3 in the nation.

"I don't think you ever forget about missing out on Spencer Hawes," Telep said. "Because he's

good enough to carry a team to a national championship." But even without Hawes, Telep ranked UNC's class second in the nation behind Ohio State, based mostly on its all-world backcourt commitments.

Future Tar Heels Wayne Ellington, a shooting guard, and Tywon Lawson, a point guard from Virginia basketball factory Oak

Hill, are considered to be the best prospects at their respective posi-tions, which usually would mean they are NBA-bound.

But thanks to a new ruling that says players cannot enter the NBA Draft until a year after their high school class has graduated, Lawson and Ellington must spend at least a year in Chapel Hill — unlike for-mer UNC signee J.R. Smith.

Williams now has one project-ed scholarship remaining, and he probably will use it on another big man. North Carolina has offered scholarships to top-15 prospects Brandan Wright, Thaddeus Young and Darrell Arthur, all of whom

are 6-foot-8 or taller. And even if Williams doesn't land one of those three, Telep said next year's Tar Heel squad should

be an instant contender. Said Telep: "I firmly believe that the class that North Carolina is bringing in gives them an opportu-nity to compete to be the best team in the country."
