of computer technology.

"We're finding that kids begin to realize that information is a commodity and that they can get it anywhere," Bradburn said.

Teachers also enjoy more flexibility when they can incorporate technology into assignments, she said.

But some say technology has to be implemented carefully, without displacing the traditional tech iques that have been learned and adjusted for generations.
"I think that we run the risk of

becoming really superficial ... not learning from our past mistakes," Bradburn said. Laptops are now one of the dominant examples of technology, and outfitting students is a goal for many school districts across

But they might not always be the

ideal tool, Bradburn cautioned. "I'm not sure that in 10 to 15 years laptops will be the most effective way of delivering infor-mation," she said, suggesting that some other tool could replace the laptop as the most versatile hardware for students.

No matter what form new technology takes, education officials say its role in the classroom will continue to grow. And teachers are rapidly adjusting their focus in the hope that students will be best prepared for capitalizing on the opportuni-ties afforded by new resources.
