# 1 DIES IN FALL FROM DORM

4-story plummet shocks campus; other student is in 'fair condition'

tant to me right now is being around people who experienced it and feel the same way I do," Alan Kneidel, a sophomore from Charlotte who lives on the third floor, said Sunday. "I can barely control my emotions

if I'm alone in the shower."

Those who witnessed the fall saw, by all accounts, an unintended tragedy. They say

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In an accident Friday, two UNC students fell out of a third-floor Stacy Residence Hall window onto a ramp four stories below.

#### Student deaths at UNC

Keith Shawn Smith is the third UNC student in the last 18 ars to die after an accidental fall from a campus building

— and the second of the three not to be under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

March 1988: David Mantey, a 22-year-old senior, falls to his death from the ninth floor of Granville Towers. Mantey's girlfriend speculates that the potential Phi Betta Kappa inductee was under the influence of hallucinogenic mushrooms, but medical examinations rule out alcohol and drugs as causes of the fall

April 1995: Freshman Jamie McGee dies after falling as she and a friend try to climb Phillips Annex in the middle of the night. The case makes national headlines when it becomes known that McGee, who is only 18, was served alcohol earlier in the evening at Buckheads, a Franklin Street bar at the time. The bartender is charged in the incident.

## Students fall from derm window

About 12:20 a.m. Racing down the hall Sophomore Keith Shawn Smith and freshman Tyler Downey were racing down the third-floor hallway of Stacy Residence Hall. They fell four floors and landed on a ramp outside the entrance to the hall's basement-level laundry room, which faces Country Club Road.

12:23 a.m. Student calls 911 **UNC freshman Adam Farag** hears the two fall, races from across the street and calls 911.

About 12:28 a.m. Police respond to scene Smith and Downey are taken to UNC Hospitals by Orange County emergency response units. Police investigate, and students gather in shock

A quiet dorm Police declare the scene clear. A few students remained, some crying and others silent.

Smith reported dead A hospital representative says that Smith has "expired." Downey is reported to be in critical condition.

Mid-morning Friday Smith's parents arrive Smith's parents visit Stacy and gather a few belongings.

Friday evening In 'fair condition' After sittting in critical condition for more than 13 hours, Downey is reported to be in "fair condition," which means he is conscious, though he might be uncomfortable, and his vital signs are stable and within normal limits.

As the resident adviser for the third floor

of Stacy Residence Hall, Keith Shawn Smith, 20, fostered a bond among his hallmates.

Three days after Smith's death, that camaraderie has provided solace for the more than two dozen men on the hall.

"One of his best skills was being able to get along with everyone," said freshman Eric Sabo of Westlake, Ohio. "He could be your RA, but at the same time he was also one of your best friends."

Smith was more than the leader on the hall, say those who lived with him. His genial demeanor brought the residents together.

The residents reminisced about the activities and events Smith organized to bring the students on the hall together, such as a version of hide-andseek in which everything on the floor was fair game.

"He would try to get everyone to go as a whole to eat or to (athletic) games," Sabo said.
"A couple weeks ago, he cooked us a whole spaghetti dinner."

The residents formed a fraternal bond with Smith - who would yell, "Daddy's home!" to announce his return to the floor - that they say is unique across campus.

"Our hall is probably the most amazing hall I've seen," said John Pope, a freshman from Charlotte. "And Keith's right in the middle of every-

Smith's dedication carried over to his work on the Honor Court board, where he demonstrated concerns for students' interests when on the bench, said Erin Scharling, executive vice chairwoman of the Honor Court.

"It was clear that he was a court member that had a high level of compassion for the stu-dents he was judging," she said. "His enthusiasm and his com-passion are definitely going to

Smith, an economics major, had an interest in entrepreneurial work and wanted to own his own business, Pope said. "That's been one of the hardest things to
