N.Y.C. mayors don't lie ... about Shakira

New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg is backing more than political candidates these days. Bloomberg endorsed Colombian pop-phenom Shakira in the race for Video of the Year at MTV's Video Music Awards. He threw his support behind the singer in a taped spot that aired Tuesday on MTV's "Total Request Live," picking Shakira's video "Hips Don't Lie" as his favorite to win. Other nominated artists include Madonna, the Red Hot Chili Peppers, Panic! At the Disco and Christina Aguilera — who's from Staten Island. "I think I'm going to have to go with Shakira — those hips don't lie," Bloomberg said.
